# Buell breaks USD USD hosts Hughes show April 9 pole vault record

University of South Dakota pole vaulter Bethany Buell set a new career-best and USD outdoor record of 14 feet, 7 inches while winning section A of the women's pole vault on Friday night at the Texas Relays. The mark is the best height in the nation so far this season.

Buell became the first Coyote to win at the Texas Relays and broke the previous USD record of 14-51/2 she set last season. She's also the second Coyote to break a record at the relays.

Jeff Mettler set a new record while finishing third in the men's 3,000-meter steeplechase on Thursday

minutes, 54.40 seconds, breaking the old record of 8:58.95.

Two other Coyotes placed in the top-ten in the pole vault. Emily Grove was seventh with a mark of 13-93/4, and Madison Mills was eighth with a mark of 13-33/4.

South Dakota also had two place in the top-five in section B of the men's shot put. Kyle McKelvey placed third with a toss of 55-434 while Cody Snyder was fourth with a throw of 55-11/2.

This unique musical experience, which is free and open to the public, also utilizes engaging videography during the performance to link the words and music of Hughes' poetry with topical images of "Ask Your Mama's" people, places, events, showcasing the visual artists Hughes admired and collaborated with over the

course of his distinguished career. The words, images and music recreate a magical moment in cultural history. bridging the Harlem renaissance, the post-World War II beat writers' coffeehouse jazz poetry world and the looming Black Arts performance explosion of the

The performance is brought to life by the Ron McCurdy Quartet. McCurdy is professor of music in the Thornton School of Music at the University of Southern California and is pastpresident of the International

Association for Jazz Education. Additionally, he is the director of the National Grammy Vocal Jazz Ensemble and combo, and also serves as director of the Walt Disney All-American College Band in Anaheim, CA.

University of South Dakota men's golf shot 300-308-301 - 909 and improved from 11th-place to a tie for seventh in the final round of the 41st Annual Beu Mussatto Invitational at the Harry Mussatto Golf Course in Macomb, IL, on Saturday afternoon.

Sam Matthew led the final round charge, shooting a 71 to jump from a tie for 30th to 10th-place at 5-over-par. Also making a big leap was Alex Kline, who entered the third round tied for 66th but fired a 72 to improve 37 spots to a tie for 29th at 14-over-par.

Jordan Rykal's opening round of 71 tied for the best round of any Coyote at the tournament and shot 71-76-83 - 230 over the two-day event, finishing tied with Rykal for 29th overall.

Dakota Clark finished two strokes behind his teammates at 232 (16-overpar) and tied for 43rd among individual competitors.

Marc Gubbels finished 76th at the event, shooting 77-81-85 – 243. Miles Death competed unattached and shot 78-79-76 – 233 to tie for 51st individually.

South Dakota State finished first in the team standings, posting an overall score of 300-285-304 – 889 to beat IUPUI by two strokes. IUPUI's Santiago Ruiz was the top individual finisher at the event, shooting 73-73-70 – 217 to finish +1.

The Coyotes will have 16 days off before returning to the links at the Tennessee State Tournament in Old Hickory, TN, on April 15.
