

SDDOT seeks public comment

PIERRE – The South Dakota Department of Transportation is in the process of developing the newest four-year Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP).

The STIP is a list of transportation projects developed through a coordinated effort involving many state, federal and local entities that identify highway and intermodal improvements to preserve, renovate and enhance South Dakota's transportation system. The department encourages participation and comments from citizens throughout the development process.

Department staff will be reviewing the status of existing projects and identifying potential new projects to add to the STIP this spring.

Public meetings will be held at various locations across the state in July where attendees can get more information and provide input in person.

The department welcomes comments from the public year-round on potential projects, but is asking for input no later than April 15, to ensure all comments are considered during the development of the 2015-2018 STIP.

The current 2014-2017 STIP can be viewed at www.sddot.com by clicking the link on the left side of the page. Users can then view the entire approved STIP document and an interactive map of projects, or select specific counties from a dropdown list.

Notice of Responsibility to Control Noxious Weeds and Declared Pests

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN this 28th day of March, 2014, pursuant to SDCL 38-22 as amended to all owners, occupants, agents and public officials in charge of lands in Clay County, South Dakota, that they are responsible of he suppression, control, and eradication of noxious weeds and declared pest infestations that may exist on such lands.

Chemical, biological, and/or cultural control methods used for the suppression, control and eradication of noxious weed and declared pest infestations shall be those approved for such purposes by the Clay County Weed and Pest Supervisor, County Agricultural Extension Agent or the South Dakota State University Experiment Station.

Upon failure to observe this notice, the county weed and pest board is required to proceed pursuant to the law and have the noxious weeds or declared pests destroyed by such methods as they may find necessary, the expense of which shall constitute a lien and be entered as a tax against the land, and be collected as other real estate taxes are collected, or by other means as provided by law.

Plant and animals designated as being noxious weeds and declared pests in the state of South Dakota are Leafy Spurge, Salt Cedar, Perennial Sow Thistle, Russian Knapweed, Hoary Cress, Canada Thistle, Purple Loosestife, Prairie Dogs, and Gypsy Moth.

In addition, Musk Thistle and Plumless Thistles have been approved by the State Weed and Pest Control Commission as locally noxious weeds and are subject to the same suppression, control and eradication requirements as the before mentioned plants and animals.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that upon establishing probable cause to believe a noxious weed or declared pest infestation exists upon any property in Clay county, a representative of the Clay County Weed and Pest Control Board will enter upon said property for the purpose of inspecting and confirming that such infestation actually exists.

The Wacipi was open to anyone who wished to attend. Those not familiar with the customs of a powwow soon noticed different styles of dance taking place on the floor of the DakotaDome.

The men's traditional dance symbolizes a battle or the story of a hunt. The men's grass dance is said to have come from the past, when dancers were sent in first to stomp down long grass to make a clearing for the other dancers during a powwow.

Men's fancy dancing became a traditional part of Wacipis in the late 1900s. Boys and young men, who wear brilliantly colored bustles and dance regalia, prefer this style.

The women's traditional dance is simple in appearance, but plays a very important symbolic role. The dancers move their feet to the beat of the drum to represent the heartbeat of mother earth, to heal the world.

Many of the women and young girls wore jingle dresses. The small jingles that
