It may not have been an ideal way to open a baseball season, but at least the Vermillion Tanagers have something tangible to work from after Monday's opener at Dakota Valley. The Tanagers fell

behind early and could never mount a serious rally to make a run at the host Panthers as Dakota Valley rolled to a 15-5, five-inning, mercy-rule win on a near perfect day for baseball.

The rivals played this game as a non-region contest.

Vermillion (0-1) finished with seven hits, but a seven-run third inning by the host Panthers was enough for the hosts to pull away

"It's the first game of the season so it's hard to get any kind of litmus on what we need to work on until we have a game like this," Vermillion Head Coach Jason Gault said. "We know we have to do a better job throwing strikes early in the count and especially against a good hitting team like Dakota Valley. They are probably some of the better ones in the state. Then you leave the ball over the plate and that's where they do their damage.

"I thought we pitched out of some jams. We have to hit and move guys around on base. We have to have no walks or hit batsmen and we had eight or nine, we have to play defense behind our pitchers, and we have to put the ball in play when we have guys in scoring position.

We that below average on a scale and we have things we have to work on."

The contest was the first between the two schools since the Panthers' shocking elimination of the Tanagers during the American Legion playoffs one step short of the state tournament.

"We had to see where we stood with DV and they played a lot better than us and won the game," Tanager senior Jack Brown said. "We were all focused on the game since we have less than a handful of guys that even played in that Legion game last year. We just didn't come to play like they did."

The Panthers struck first with back-to-back doubles by Brady Dam and Austin Carver to start up the bottom of the first inning with a quick 1-0 lead. Leading 2-0 the Pan-

thers loaded the bases with one out against Vermillion starter Jacob Odens, but a thrown out base runner and a strikeout stopped the bleeding.

Travis Weber recorded the first Tanager hit of the season with a double to lead off the top half of the second frame.

Two outs later a tough grounder to the hole by Kaedyn Brown induced a DV error at first and Weber scored to cut the Tanager deficit in half.

A single, a hit batsmen, and an infield single by Carter gave DV a 3-1 lead in the home half of the second inning.

The Panthers built a 5-1 lead in their next at-bat when Grant Meier ripped a line drive homer over left field.

Three batters later saw Vermillion face another bases sacked situation and with no outs to boot, forcing Gault to replace Odens with Hunter Christopherson.

Despite getting the balls in play the Tanagers needed the Panthers still finagled three more runs to go up 8-1 and then a twoout error and a wild pitch gave DV a 11-1 lead after three innings.

Vermillion scored two runs in the top of fourth, highlighted by a Carter Kratz RBI single.

Dam put DV up 15-3 in the bottom of the fourth when he cleared the bases with a no-out grand slam and essentially wrap up the Panthers' second win of the season.

Vermillion scored two final runs in the top of the fifth inning with an RBI double by Cole Anderson
