

# Coyoteopoly nets grant for Shakespeare Fest

The National Endowment for the Arts and the South Dakota Tourism Board has awarded the University of South Dakota's Coyoteopoly a \$3,500 grant in support of the South Dakota Shakespeare Festival.

Launched in 2012 by members of the USD Department of Theatre faculty Chaya Gordon-Bland and Scott Mollman and Beacom School of Business professor Gregory Huckabee, the South Dakota Shakespeare Festival is held in June at

Vermillion's Prentis Park. The South Dakota Shakespeare Festival was developed to increase the cultural, artistic and educational offerings to the people of the Vermillion community and surrounding area. In addition to high quality, professional Shakespeare performances, the Festival includes educational artistic events in a free and accessible format.

With contributions from more than 100 sponsors from eight states, the South Dakota Shakespeare Festival is

owned and produced by Coyoteopoly-Rotary, a USD Beacom School of Business-student run corporation that strives to provide charitable work for the Vermillion area.

Since its inception in the fall of 2004, Coyoteopoly has had a net revenue of more than \$200,000 that has gone directly to charities and organizations of local interest.

## Deer license deadlines near

A couple of reminders for the sportsmen in the area as a few questions have been coming in. The deadline for East River Deer season application is coming up on Aug. 30. The season dates are Nov. 23 to Dec. 8.

For Union and Clay counties, the deer tags have been reduced. In Union County there will be 400 "any deer" licenses available, and in Clay County there will be 300 "any deer" licenses available. No antlerless deer licenses are available for the 2013 East River deer season in these two counties. This means there will not be an extended antlerless season for this area.

Muzzleloader applications are also due on Aug. 30. Again, only "any deer" licenses are valid for Clay and Union counties. The season date is Dec. 1-31.

Archery deer applications may be applied for at any time. The season dates are Sept. 28-

Jan. 15. Again, only "any deer" archery licenses are valid for Clay and Union counties. Antlerless archery deer licenses are not valid in Clay and Union counties. This means the extended antlerless season (Jan. 1-15) will be closed in this area. More counties are included in this restriction, so please review the applications.

To obtain a free Access Permit, you must first purchase the license type that is valid for this unit. After you have received your license, then you may apply for the Access Permit on the SD GF&P Web site. The Access Permit is a limited draw. The deadline to apply for the archery deer Access Permits is Aug. 21, 8 a.m.

Youth Deer licenses will be valid with only one license type available for this area. There is no deadline for this application. The season dates are Sept. 14-Jan. 15.

## Vermillion/Beresford soccer team has successful season

The girls played in six match-up games in Sioux Falls with no losses. They played in a Tea Tournament and made it to the championship round and

lost by 2 against a tough U10 Spencer team.

The next two tournaments were played in Yankton and Sioux Falls with a 6-2 record. For their last tournament, they traveled to Norfolk, NE, and won first place.

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After Jack Brown reached to load the bases again, a pop-out and a strikeout retired two Vermillion batters without scoring any of the runners. But Regan Bye came through with two outs, bouncing a single through the left side to score Odens and Miller, a hit that would prove to be the difference in the game. Vermillion took comfortable 5-0 lead after two innings.

Markee rolled through the first three innings without giving up a run thanks to some tremendous defense behind him. But Markee ran into trouble with the top of the Dakota Valley lineup in the fourth. Dakota Valley used four hits to plate three runs and cut the lead to two. After the inning, Markee gave way to reliever Ethan James, who pitched the rest of the game.

The game's final three innings were void of any runs but full of excitement. James' combination of fastballs and knuckleballs kept Dakota Valley off balance while his defense played strong, errorless baseball behind him.

In the seventh and final inning, James walked the leadoff batter to bring the tying run to the plate, a glimpse of momentum for Dakota Valley. But a flyout, a strikeout, and another flyout silenced Dakota Valley and sent Vermillion to third round undefeated.

### Vermillion, 4 - Harrisburg, 2

The Vermillion offense, which had been powerful to this point, met strong resistance in the third round as Harrisburg sent its ace pitcher to the mound. Vermillion pushed across a run in the first, but the hurler held Vermillion to just that in the first five innings, giving Harrisburg a 2-1 advantage after five.

Markee returned to the hill for Vermillion, rolling through the first two innings, but hit a rough patch in the third. Harrisburg capitalized on an error in the Vermillion

outfield to score two runs in the inning. After Markee allowed Harrisburg to load the bases with one out later in the inning, he was lifted in favor of Carter Kratz.

Although he came into a tough situation, Kratz was up to the task, striking out back-to-back Harrisburg hitters to keep the game at 2-1.

Vermillion finally made its move with two outs in the sixth. Mockler delivered a clutch, RBI single, scoring Kratz to tie the game.

But the Vermillion offensive rally was not over. Odens followed Mockler with a double of his own, giving Vermillion a lead it would not relinquish.

After Odens, Miller doubled him home, adding an insurance run and pushing the score to 4-2.

Kratz pitched a scoreless sixth to get the win in the game, and James came to the hill in the seventh to capture his second save in as many games.

### Vermillion, 8 - Harrisburg, 1

After two close contests in their last two games, the Teeners made quick work of Harrisburg in the championship game.

Vermillion gave Jake Odens the ball, and he turned in a championship effort. Odens went all seven innings, allowing only one run to get the win. Harrisburg put runners on base in every inning, but Odens always manage to limit the damage while his offense gave him the lead.

For the fourth game in a row, Vermillion scored in the first inning. With two outs in the inning, Jack Brown walked then quickly stole second. Regan Bye singled Brown home to give the Teeners an early lead.

Two more runs in the third pushed the lead to 3-0, an advantage that would be plenty for Odens.

Vermillion continually added runs throughout the game, building an 8-1

lead going into the last inning. Playing shortstop, James put an exclamation point on the game with one out in bottom of the seventh.

With a runner on first, a Harrisburg batter hit a sharp liner between shortstop and third.

James made a beautiful back-handed stab, snaring the ball and wasting no time firing toward first. Bye secured the ball at first before the runner could return to the bag, and the double play officially sent Vermillion to the state

tournament.

The Teeners will meet Volga in game one of the state tournament held in Harrisburg beginning Friday. Vermillion will look to duplicate the Legion and 13/14 Teeners, who each reached the state title game last week.
