Coyotes – like every other FCS team – could benefit from the new playoff criteria, given they improve to the point where they win six or seven games.  
“Even if it didn’t change, it fuels the fire,” senior defensive back Devin Taverna said. “That’s the goal; you want to win and you want to get the championship.”  
The fact that other teams across the country have jumped from one win to a playoff berth gives a team like USD hope, Taverna added.  
“It’s easy motivation,” he said. “Like coach Glenn said, there’s teams like Montana that were picked dead last and came out and won.”  
For the 16 seniors on the team, making one of those dramatic turnarounds is naturally the goal, Murtha said.  
“I have one year left, so hopefully we can make it there,” he said. “It’s a goal, but we need to win each game first.”  
“I want to have short team goals; to win Cal Davis, then win the next game.”

make the payments.  
However, Prescott said the city is not guaranteeing the bonds if the generated tax revenue is insufficient to fully repay the bond holders.  
“There’s no guarantee on behalf of the city that we would reimburse these groups and organizations for the funds that they put forth to make it happen,” he said.  
As the value of the district increases, the total property taxes paid by the owners of the property also will increase, which is the “increment.”  
The memo said the county will collect the property taxes and transfer the proceeds of the increment to the city, which will disburse the funds to the bond holders as interest and principal payments until the bonds are retired, other advances are repaid or 20 years have passed – whichever comes first.  
The land in the TIF district is classified as Blocks 1-6 of Bliss Pointe, which extends from the west side of Stanford Street between west Main and west Cherry streets.  
Prescott said houses in the \$125,000 to \$250,000

price range could be built there at the rate of 15 per year.

There also will be some light commercial uses, primarily office, as well as retail and restaurant, he said.

The VCDC closed on the sale of approximately 30 acres of developable farmland in April as a solution to the shortage of affordable single-family housing in the community.

It was announced last month that the VCDC has been in contact with interested developers, who will be able to purchase lots from them. There will be approximately 114 residential lots.

“People aren’t going to be able to come in and buy a bunch of lots, hold them, raise the price, do that sort of thing,” Steve Howe, executive director of the VCDC, said last month. “A developer, if they want to come in and buy 10 lots, same rule. They’ve got to be building on them and doing stuff with them.”

“We have been getting quite a bit of interest – not only from the single-family homebuilder – about when lots are going to be available. Whether they actually come through, you never know, but anecdotally, there is a lot of interest,” he said.

**Turner County resident is first SD WNV death**

The Department of Health reported Aug. 20 that a Turner County resident in the 70 to 79 age group has died of West Nile virus (WNV). To protect patient confidentiality, additional information about the deceased is not being released.  
“Our sympathy is with the family. We only hope their tragic loss will encourage others to take seriously the threat of West Nile and take steps to protect themselves,” said Dr. Lon Kightlinger, state epidemiologist for the Department of Health.  
To prevent mosquito bites and reduce the risk of WNV, the department recommends the following personal precautions:  
• Use mosquito repellents (DEET, picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus or IR3535) and limit exposure by covering up.  
• Limit time outdoors from dusk to midnight

when Culex mosquitoes are most active.  
• Get rid of standing water that gives mosquitoes a place to breed.  
• Support local mosquito control efforts.  
Personal precautions are especially important for those at high risk for WNV – people over 50, pregnant women, transplant patients, individuals with diabetes or high blood pressure, and those with a history of alcohol abuse. People with severe or unusual headaches should see their physicians.  
Thirty-two South Dakota counties have now had WNV detections. So far this year there have been 52 human WNV cases, 15 positive blood donors, eight positive birds, two positive horses and 249 positive mosquito pools.
