The motion was seconded by Alderman Ward. Discussion followed and the question of the adoption of the Resolution was presented for a vote of the Governing Body. 9 members voted in favor of and 0 members voted in opposition to the Resolution. Mayor Powell declared that the Resolution was adopted.

C. Request to remove parking on both sides of N. Dakota Street from W. Duke Street to Highway 50 during events at the USD Dakota Dome

David Herbster, Athletic Director, stated that the construction south of the Dakota Dome will have this area fenced off and the student entrance is going to be moved to the northwest entrance. Dave stated that with the construction area going to the east side of Dakota Street in the area he requested that parking be removed from both sides of Dakota Street from Duke Street to Highway 50 during events at the dome. Dave stated that this request is for pedestrian safety in this area. He said that the Foundation has approved using the field north of the foundation for parking thus pedestrians will be crossing the street and others will be walking from the south without any sidewalk. James Bandy, Sr., Associate Director of Athletics and Internal Operations, reviewed a map of the area noting that removing the parking will allow the University to install barricades during the events so that vehicles do not park and allow this area for pedestrian traffic to the dome. James stated that the USD Department of Athletics request is to block off all street parking on both sides of Dakota Street from Duke Street to Highway 50 for all events held in the Dakota Dome to ensure safety of individuals attending the events. He stated that this will be coordinated with USD and Vermillion Police Departments. Discussion followed with James noting that visitor bus parking will be allowed on Dakota Street south of the northwest entrance as was approved at last meeting.

Amanda Whittecar, Manager of the Holiday Inn Express, stated that she was concerned about the removal of on street parking as they have 56 rooms and off street parking for 56 cars but for large events there are more than one car per room and that motel staff also needs parking. Discussion followed on the parking request of USD. David Herbster stated that they are willing to work with the area businesses to resolve this parking issue. Amanda stated that for large events they may need up to 20 extra parking spaces.

Alderman Holland moved approval of the request of the USD Athletic Department to remove parking on both sides of Dakota Street from Duke Street to Highway 50 during events at the Dakota Dome to be communicated with the USD and Vermillion Police Departments and the Athletic department will need to accommodate the parking needs of the adjoining businesses. Alderman Erickson seconded the motion. Discussion followed on the other business parking needs. Motion carried 9 to 0. Mayor Powell declared the motion adopted.

D. Tree Board appointments
Mayor Powell reported that there are currently two openings on the Tree Board. Mayor Powell stated that an expression of interest form was received from Clarence Pederson and he recommended his appointment to the Tree Board.

A. Annual supply of propane for Solid Waste Department

Jason Anderson, Assistant City Engineer, reported that bids were opened August 13th for the annual supply of propane for the Landfill and Recycling Center. The low

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bid was from Tri County Oil & Propane for \$1.349 per gallon. Jason stated that the bid was for up to 17,000 gallons to be delivered as needed to the Landfill and Recycling Center and if the usage exceeds that amount the City will need to purchase at the market rate.

Associated Press poll. Since becoming a D-I counter in 2010, USD has played the likes of Central Florida, Minnesota, Air Force, Wisconsin, Northwestern and Kansas.

South Dakota State, meanwhile, has since 2008 played Iowa State, Minnesota, Nebraska (twice), Illinois and Kansas. The Jackrabbits have really tried to zero in on the Midwest for those guarantee games, according to head coach John Stiegelmeier. He called it a "win-win" for the program and for its fans.

"We don't schedule them to see where we get to go," Stiegelmeier said. "We want to keep them within the region so people recognize the name and are able to get there.

"We don't want to be going some place we didn't even know existed." Instead, if SDSU can schedule a game within driving distance for fans and alumni in the area, that would be ideal, according to athletic director Justin Sell.

"That's been a high priority for us," Sell said. "We look at them as great days for our university, not just the athletic department. It gives everyone a chance to rally behind something together."

And yes, if that school making the trip can leave with a big paycheck, that's another bonus for playing up a level. For making the trip to Eugene, USD will receive \$525,000, which is by far the most it has ever received in six previous FBS games. It is, however, not the highest in recent memory for the Missouri Valley Football Conference — Michigan State paid Youngstown State \$650,000 for last season's matchup.

"It certainly helps, there's no doubt about that," Herbster said. "You don't want to live on those things, either, though." Some FCS schools will play two FBS games a season, to earn two large paychecks. USD has done that twice, back in 2010 with Central Florida and Minnesota, and in 2011 with Air Force and Wisconsin.

Missouri Valley school Northern Iowa is playing others in the country, can

GOLF TEAMS SET FOR FIRST MATCH OF FALL

The fall season tees off Saturday in Omaha for the University of South Dakota Coyotes' golf squads.

There they will take on the University of Nebraska-Omaha at the Tiburon Golf Club. The meet is an exhibition that USD head coach Nick Hovden will use as an intrasquad qualifier toward seeing who from the men's and women's teams will play in tournaments starting Sept. 9 in Edwardsville, Illinois and Lincoln, Nebraska respectively.

"It's nice that instead of playing with your own team you get to play against another team on a different course and make it more of a tournament atmosphere," Hovden said. "Omaha is pretty similar to us and have a pretty deep roster. They added about four guys and about three or four ladies. It will be a surprise since it will be a lot of new faces. We match up pretty well. We are looking forward to it."

The Coyotes are led by senior Sam Matthew on the men's side while sophomore Brenna Lervick paces the USD women.

The course should be a nice challenge to open the season
"I worked out there for two summers as an

assistant when I was teaching and coaching in Omaha," Hovden said. "It's a tough course similar to the Bluffs. It will be a nice test for the teams and give us a change of pace. It will be something that could give the kids looks at some different shots they aren't used to."

Ten women and nine men will represent USD in Omaha.

SOFTBALL TRYOUTS ANNOUNCED

The USD softball team will hold tryouts for the Coyote softball program on Tuesday starting at 5:15 p.m. at Nygaard Field.

"We are holding a tryout to make sure there isn't any talent on campus that we don't know about," USD head coach Amy Klyse said. "We don't need numbers. I think we are surrounded by states that go under the radar in recruiting including South Dakota. Some of those kids could be drawn to USD for academics that may have been missed."

Klyse said that there are no scholarships available but the spots are for walk on potentials only.

two FBS games this year, and it did the same thing back in 2012. Indiana State also played two, last fall against Indiana and Purdue.

South Dakota State, meanwhile, has played one FBS game a year since 2008. "Fortunately we're not in that position," Sell said.

Finding a game that fits the above-mentioned criteria now presents challenges, however, Herbster said.

He called it "frustrating" that the Big Ten Conference — and its many regional schools — would prefer its members to avoid scheduling FCS games. Why?

Because, the conference pushed for 12-game seasons, to get one more game to reach six wins (and bowl eligibility), he said. But now, with the Big Ten television network and its national audience, the league wants higher-profile games.

South Dakota State has already been directly affected by the Big Ten situation. The Jackrabbits were supposed to face Minnesota in 2016, but that contract got bought out by Texas Christian, which means SDSU is now traveling to TCU in 2016.

"That's probably as far out as we'd like to go," Sell said. The fear from FBS schools about scheduling a lower-level opponent that could very well win the game was proven to be rather accurate last season. The FCS members scored 16 victories against FBS schools last season, an increase from 10 in 2012.

That very well might prove that the FCS brand is rather competitive with the "big boys," Sell said.

"Some of the schools in our league, and some of the

be just as good as the middle-tier teams in some FBS conferences," he said. "I hope in time we can get to the point of labeling it by quality programs, and not by divisions."

Another challenge in scheduling FBS games? Schools have no way of knowing how the game will look down the line — sometimes those games are scheduled as far out as 7-8 years.

"You never know how someone's going to be a few years in advance," Herbster said. "We certainly didn't see them being the number three team in the country."

Down the line, the Jackrabbits will visit Kansas next season, Texas Christian in 2016 and Iowa State in 2018. The Coyotes have games scheduled at Kansas State next season and at Iowa State for 2020.

As for the matter at hand this week, traveling to SEC country to face Missouri, the Jackrabbits are trying to avoid the awe factor, Stiegelmeier said.

"I don't want our guys to go down there and think we're playing a team in a different world," he said.

The Coyotes have said the same thing all pre-season. They realize who they're playing Saturday night, but they're treating this is a once-in-a-lifetime experience, according to junior quarterback Kevin Earl.

"It's going to be unlike anything we've been a part of," he said. "It'll be a memory I'll hold for the rest of my life."
