The Vermillion City Library Monthly Report was accepted and placed on file.

Bob Iverson/Solid Waste Management met with the Board to review the damages of the recent landfill fire and what is expected in the future for operations.

Terry Taggart/Soil Conservation District Board Member met with the Board requesting additional funding of \$4000 for 2012 Budget. Dry Conditions (less planting) tractor rental and other items made them short on funding for the year.

Passick moved, seconded by Wilson and carried to approve a maximum allocation of \$4000 to the Soil Conservation Budget for 2012, but will allocate less if planting revenue is received by the year's end.

Kephart moved, seconded by Passick and carried to pass and adopt the county wage scale for 2013 with a 3% increase over 2012 and step increases for those who qualify, as proposed in the 2013 budgets.

The Program Contract for 2013 was submitted on behalf of the Director of Equalization. The current company (Cama) supplying computer software, hardware and service program has gone out of business. Manatron Inc. was selected to replace the licensed software, hardware and service programs for Clay County being comparable to what the county currently uses.

Passick moved, seconded by Packard and carried to authorize the Chairman to sign said Contract/Agreement for 2013.

At 10:45 a.m. Passick moved, seconded by Packard and carried to recess and convene as Ditch Board to review Engineer quotes for specification on Clay Creek Ditch.

Kephart moved, seconded by Passick and carried to have each commissioner study the information received from the four engineering firms and bring back their recommendations at next week's meeting (Dec-4).

At 10:50 a.m. Kephart moved, seconded by Packard and carried to adjourn as Ditch Board and reconvene as Board of Commissioners.

The Board discussed the county van-2003 Ford and what should be done as to fixing/repairing or possible purchase of a newer model. It was the consensus of the Board that any needed repairs should be done at this time, making it safe to drive, since it is taken out of town frequently.

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Davis-Bahcall Scholarship offers opportunities to young scientists

South Dakota high school seniors and college freshmen can now apply for Davis-Bahcall Scholarships and the chance to study next summer at the Sanford Underground Science and Engineering Laboratory in Lead with world-renowned researchers from universities across the United States and overseas, if funding allows.

Applications are available on the South Dakota Department of Education's website. Up to 12 South Dakota students will receive scholarships. The deadline to apply is Jan. 20, 2013.

Select students will be invited to interview at various locations in the state for the program; scholarship winners will be announced by early March.

Davis-Bahcall Scholarship recipients spend one month during the summer studying such things as physics, engineering and

geology, and learning from distinguished professors from around the world.

In addition to the one-month summer study, those receiving scholarships may have the opportunity to apply for pre-selected summer internships.

To be eligible for the scholarships, high school seniors and college freshmen must attend public or private high schools or postsecondary institutions in South Dakota. Home-school students also are eligible. Students must have a demonstrated interest in science and intend to pursue advanced degrees in math, science, engineering or technology.

The scholarships, which are funded by the 3M Company and the South Dakota Space Grant Consortium, are named for renowned physicists Dr. Ray Davis and Dr. John Bahcall.
