# **Parade Of Lights And Library Event Celebrate The Holidays**

Friday evening a tradition will continue that has become a Vermillion favorite throughout the years: the an-

nual Parade of Lights.

"The whole thing starts at 6:30," said Tim Bellis of the Vermillion Chamber and Development Company. "The color guard will come in followed by the marching band. Prior to them arriving I believe it's the chamber singers from USD will be at the Platz singing Christmas carols setting the mood while CorTrust hands out hot chocolate. Then they come on in to kick things off and the parade comes on down Main St. all lit up. At the end Santa Claus will come on in. He'll go and make a couple of comments in front of the tree and then they will flip the switch and light up the tree for the official kickoff for the holidays."

The parade begins on Main St around Amy's Whoopti Do Salon and travels down to CorTrust Bank with everyone congregating at the Platz for the tree lighting.

"I have a list that continues to grow," said Bellis. "It is currently at 15 entries but we still have probably another six or seven that we're waiting to hear back from then there's always a surprise or two. In the end we should have about 20 or more entries.'

The parade entries are always different and no one knows ahead of time what all of them will look like.

"It's always a surprise," Bellis said. "That's part of the fun because sometimes people come in with things that are totally novel and never seen before. People are walking, there's going to be a big giant bear, vehicles, the marching band, the color guard. We'll see pickups and flatbeds, we'll see actual floats. There will be a fire truck and the Charlie Coyote shuttle bus. "If the weather will permit there's going to be an old-fashioned great big bicycle. The farmer's market is going to bring in a combine all decorated up. So there's going to be some variety.

I like the horses when they show up with the sleigh. I missed last year but someone told me WNAX showed up with something with a balloon so it was totally different and everyone was talking about that. A couple of years ago there was a float that had the Grinch theme from the folks at the Spa at Wynie Mae's."

According to Bellis, the parade should be long enough but not too

Even if it's cold and the weather is a little nippy it's still pretty cozy because there can be anywhere from 1,000-2,000 people that show up," he said. "It will usually depend on weather. If there's fairly decent weather it can definitely draw in some numbers.'

The tree to be lit at the end of the parade has a special story this year according to Bellis.

"The hospital always lit up that big tree out on Plum and Main," he said. "Well the hospital is about to go through some major renovations. They're tearing down the old hospital to put up the new. They had to take that tree down to make room for all the construction that's going to happen here very shortly. That tree is the tree they just put up at the Platz. It's very big and full. So the tree that was decorated down at the hospital in addition to the donated tree is the donated tree this year."

The festivities don't end with the parade's finish either.

"After the tree is lit. Santa invites all the kids to join him and he walks of blocks away," Bellis said. "Then at the library they're all set up with arts and crafts things for the kids to do and they can spend more time with Santa personally for a couple of hours. That's one of the locations they're doing the Vermillion Food Pantry donation box and they're asking people to bring in personal care items like razors, soap, combs, things like that but they'll also take food donations.

The donations collected at the library are part of their "Forgiving for Giving"

"Patrons who have accumulated overdue fees, with certain restrictions, will be able to have those fines waived in exchange for donations of much-needed items, such as diapers, toothpaste, body wash, shampoo, deodorant, disposable razors, hand soap, dish detergent, toilet paper, etc," Library Adult Programming coordinator Susan Heggestad wrote in a press release. "A more detailed list, and further details about the amnesty restrictions, is available by stopping by our Circulation Desk or calling the library at 677.7060."

The items will be distributed by the Vermillion Food Pantry and the Domestic Violence Safe Options Services during the holidays.

"This is the second year that we've offered an amnesty campaign during the holidays, during my time here,' Heggestad said. "I believe that the library has held similar campaigns in the past. Last year's Food for Fines campaign was hugely successful, with our patrons donating over nine boxes of food in total."

According to Heggestad, the campaign last year came as a result of library patron feedback which showed interest in being able to donate to a cause like the food pantry.

"This year, we consulted with United Way Executive Director Kelsey Collier Wise to inquire which local charities would most benefit," Heggestad said. "It was suggested that we consider doing a personal care items donation campaign, as those wind up being the greatest need for both the Food Pantry and for DVSOS (Domestic Violence Safe Options Services). Patrons who bring in items to donate should know that these items will make a real and significant difference to folks right here in their own community. And the need just continues to grow, year after year. Here at the library, we're most looking forward to smiles we get when people realize they can get some relief from their overdue fines, and help out some of their fellow citizens at the same time."

Holiday Crafts at the Library - Fri., Dec., 4th


