He also teaches string bass and conducts bass workshops, in addition to publishing numerous articles.

Reinpold and Hittle will serve as the executive coordinators of the association's activities until a board of officers is approved by the membership at large.

Bluegrass association SDNG names senior enlisted leader

South Dakota Air National Guard Chief Master Sgt. James Welch, of Sioux Falls, is the state's first senior enlisted leader for the South Dakota National Guard. Welch is the first noncommissioned officer from either the South Dakota Army or Air National Guard to be named to the new position.

Welch was appointed to the position during a ceremony on Saturday, Feb. 2, at the Joint Force Headquarters building on Camp Rapid. Welch will serve as an advisor to the state's adjutant general, Maj. Gen. Tim Reisch, on all enlisted matters concerning the Guard's 4,300 soldiers and airmen, including health, morale, welfare and

Prior to the position of senior enlisted leader, Welch served as the noncommissioned-officer-incharge of operations for the 114th Civil Engineer Squadron, the 114th Fighter Wing command chief and state command chief for the South Dakota Air National Guard.

"Chief Master Sgt. Welch has a long record of exemplary service, which includes time in the regular Air Force, the South Dakota Army National Guard and the South Dakota Air National Guard," said Reisch. "He is exceptionally well prepared to perform the duties and responsibilities of this position and I look forward to working with him in this new capacity."

Welch said one of his priorities is to ensure the best for the soldiers and airmen working in the SDNG.

"With the cost cutting measures taking place, it's high on my list to make sure that our soldiers and airmen do not lose the level of readiness and training they presently have," said Welch. "They need to be mission capable and support the war fight, as well as support South Dakota,"

Welch enlisted in the Air Force in 1975 as a cable splicing specialist and was stationed at Griffis Air Force Base, NY. He obtained the rank of buck sergeant (E-4) and was honorably discharged in 1979. In 1981, he enlisted in the South Dakota Army National Guard as a 12B (engineer) and obtained the rank of sergeant (E-5).

In October 1982, Welch transferred to the South Dakota Air National Guard as a refrigeration and airconditioning technician. By January 2000, he rose to the position of noncommissioned officer-in-charge of operations in the 114th Civil Engineer Squadron, and later assumed the 114th Fighter Wing command chief position in October 2006. He served as the state command chief for the SDANG since March 2010.

Welch is married to Mary, of Sioux Falls. They have two children, Nicholas, of Sioux Falls, and Amy, 27, of Denver.




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
