Jackrabbits edge Coyotes 70-68

Road wins are typically hard to come by anyway, but the men's basketball rivalry between South Dakota State and the University of South Dakota has been especially dominated by the home team.

That is, until Saturday, Feb. 1. Picking up the first victory by the visiting team in the series in 12 years, the Jackrabbits held on late to edge the rival Coyotes 70-68 in Saturday afternoon's Summit League showdown at the DakotaDome.

The differences were small, but played a big role. Particularly in the final moments, when the Jacks (12-10, 4-3) forced two turnovers in the final 30 seconds.

"They played pretty good defense as a team, but we weren't able to do enough there down the stretch," said USD sophomore Casey Kasperbauer, who scored 17 points off the bench.

In the previous two Division I meetings in Vermillion, the script had been flipped. The Coyotes (8-13, 3-4) were the ones to see a big lead slip but ultimately hang on.

Saturday was just another what-could-have-been for a USD squad still stinging from a 3-point home loss to North Dakota State last Thursday.

"We need to come out in the second half with more energy,"

senior Trevor Gruis, owner of 16 points and six rebounds, said. "We were up one (at halftime), but we've done it before this year.

"We come out and give up a big lead on the other team, and it's just too much."

Despite trailing by as many as 15 points in the second half — and by eight with four minutes left — the Coyotes were in prime position to tie the game.

USD — down 68-66 — got the steal it needed on an in-bounds play with 11 seconds left, and the ball went into the hands of junior reserve Tyler Larson. He drove the ball down the court, but eventually had the ball poked away by the Jacks.

Two Jake Bittle free throws later iced the victory. But the question later revolved around that final play for the Coyotes — was a timeout considered?

"I'm not sure Larson had an idea where he was quite going. I was trying to scream timeout, but couldn't get it," interim head coach Joey James said. "By then the turnover occurred."

That singular play didn't seem like the biggest reason why the Coyotes lost. No, a significant disparity on rebounds played an even bigger role.

And for SDSU, that is becoming a common theme, dominating the glass.

In winning road games at Denver and at USD, the Jackrabbits out-rebounded those teams by 24 on the glass and

surrendered just four offensive rebounds. In Saturday's victory, SDSU had a 32-22 edge and held the Coyotes to just two offensive rebounds.

"That's how hard it is to win a road game," said SDSU head coach Scott Nagy, whose team won in Vermillion for the first time since 2001.

"For us, we were more physical than we've been, and where that translates for us is, we're playing harder."

On the other side, the Coyotes battled tough with two experienced teams over the weekend, with North Dakota State (the preseason favorite) and SDSU (the preseason No. 3).

"That's a veteran team we played," said James, who referred to four Jackrabbits who have played in two NCAA tournaments.

"With the transfer of Cody Larson, it gives them another big body to throw guys around and get physical."

Jordan Dykstra led the Jacks with 16 points and 11 rebounds, while Chad White and Jake Bittle combined for 18 points — all in the second half.

It was early, though, that SDSU seemed to make a statement that this latest meeting wouldn't play out like the previous two in Vermillion. Each of the past two seasons, the Jacks found themselves in a big hole early.

"That first couple minutes is important for us to get off to a

good start," said Brayden Carlson, who scored a game-high 22 points. "Especially important in this game to keep them in check right away."

And that's what the Jacks did, jumping in front 14-7 eight minutes in.

But once the Coyotes got going in transition, the tides turned. USD built as much as a 6-point cushion, but took a 32-31 lead into halftime.

Again, though, it didn't hold up.

Sophomore guard Trey Norris had 14 points, three rebounds and three assists for the Coyotes, whose bench out-scored the SDSU reserves 26-12.

And yet, with two emotional, tight home losses behind them, the question becomes: How do the Coyotes bounce back?

"That's my job to make sure they bounce back, and they continue to work hard and compete," James said. "We're close; we're really close."

While the Jackrabbits have vaulted themselves up to a winning record in the league, the Coyotes are left to collect themselves for Tuesday's non-conference game with NAIA Peru State.

"I have so much confidence in this team," Kasperbauer said. "We're going to turn it around."

"They really tried to take away Josie," said Brooks, "so at halftime we made some adjustments and the girls did a great job executing in the second half."

The Quarriers were led by Mikaela Stofferahn with 14 points and nine rebounds. Brittney Siemonsma had a double-double with 11 points and 16 rebounds.

"We didn't shoot the ball very well," said Brooks, "but created a lot of turnovers and made our free throws, which was the difference in the game."

Vermillion's Rachel Finnegan had nine points, five rebounds and two steals. Kyleigh Melstad added six points and one rebound. Tori Gregoire scored five points and grabbed two steals. Twila Sweeney had four points and three rebounds. Sydney Peters added three points and one rebound. Hailey Freidel had one point, four rebounds and one steal.

"We had a lot of girls step up and play big roles," said Brooks. "This was the best team win we have had in a while."
