# Coyote Men Fall at NDSU; Host Avila Tuesday

FARGO, N.D.—North Dakota State senior guard Lawrence Alexander made a program-record eight three-pointers and the Bison made 14 triples in all in a 71-47 win against South Dakota Saturday at Scheels Arena. Alexander led all scorers with 31 points.

The win avenged the Bison's loss to South Dakota back on Jan. 14. North Dakota State (17-7, 9-2 Summit) has won four in a row and remain atop the Summit League standings.

Alexander, along with teammates Paul Miller and Carlin Dupree, combined to make 13 of 17 threepoint tries. Miller had 11 points to go with seven rebounds. Dupree finished with 10 points. The Bison were 14 of 22 from long range. Alexander was 8

Tre Burnette had 10 points and six rebounds to lead South Dakota (11-14, 5-6). It's the third consecutive game Burnette has scored 10-plus points. Brandon Bos added eight for the Coyotes, which made 2 of 11 from beyond the arc and were held to their lowest scoring output of the

Alexander scored NDSU's first 15 points and the Bison led 12-3 eight minutes into the contest. South Dakota closed to 12-10, but another 10-2 run by NDSU made it 22-12 with five minutes to go in the first. The Bison led 35-20 at the break.

North Dakota State shot 50 percent in the first half (14-28) and the second (13-26). The Bison made 7 of 8 triples in the second stanza to detract any USD comeback hopes. NDSU also owned a 37-21 edge on

It was the first game of a threegame road trip for South Dakota, its final road games of the season before wrapping up with four at home. The Coyotes returned to the court Thursday at Omaha.

On Tuesday they play host to NAIA school Avilla at the DakotaDome. Tip time is scheduled for 7 p.m.

#### USD Rolls Past Western

One of the many rallying cries for the University of South Dakota men's basketball team this season?

Something head coach Craig Smith calls NBA: 'Next best action.'

Five days after a 1-point home loss, the Coyotes bounced back in a big way Thursday night, cruising past Western Illinois 75-61 in Summit League action at the DakotaDome.

With a game looming at first-place North Dakota State, the Coyotes (11-13, 5-5) certainly didn't want four straight losses on their backs. "It's nice to have some

momentum going into Saturday's game, that'll be a tough game," senior Brandon Bos said.

Up one at halftime against the Leathernecks (8-13, 3-7), USD was considerably more aggressive in the second half. The hosts out-scored WIU 24-10 in the paint after

'We knew we had to come out with a lot of energy, but we knew they would come back with a run," said junior Tre Burnette, who scored 19 points and grabbed seven rebounds.

The early stages of each half were dominated by the Coyotes. They started the first half 14-2 and then scored the first 14 points of the second half.

Everyone in the DakotaDome knew what USD had to do: Avoid giving it up. Senior Tyler Larson even joked later that it's well known USD has blown some big leads.

"Once we got up, we were like, 'OK we have to maintain this lead,'" Larson said.

While Bos had his usual performance (18 points, five assists, four rebounds), the bigger story was the emergence of Burnette and the late surge by Larson.

In Burnette's case, he followed up a 10-point outing last time out with 19 points Thursday. Burnette, a junior transfer, had gone 12 games in a row without reaching double figures.

"He's starting to figure some things out," Smith said.

> **USD Rolls Past Fort** Wayne, 91-80

When Lisa Loeffler missed a jumper with 6 minutes and 44 seconds left in the game, there was an audible groan from the

No, not because she was struggling. The opposite, actually.

That was the only miss of the game (8-of-9) for the senior, who scored a season-high 17 points as the University of South Dakota women held off Fort Wayne 91-80 in Summit League action Friday at the DakotaDome.

"When teams play zone, it gets the little short corner or the high post open," Loeffler said later, adding with a smile, "and that's kind of my favorite spot."

Loeffler, a 6-foot-1 Minnesota native, came in averaging 6.1 points on the season, but has now reached double figures in four of 10 league games for the first-place Coyotes (18-

"I like to think we have a pretty good connection playing (together) for a couple years," said senior Nicole Seekamp, who finished with 19 points and 10 assists — four to Loeffler.

"Whenever I'm driving, I know she's either going to be in the short corner or the elbow. It's that instinct to pass it there almost."

Yes, it was the fifth time this season the Coyotes eclipsed 90 points, but a late surge by the Mastodons (8-15, 2-8) didn't exactly have the hosts feeling as great after the game.

Fort Wayne, keyed by a game-high 27 points from senior Haley Seibert and 13 three-pointers, closed the game on a 23-7 run preventing another blowout for USD.

In short: Offense isn't the issue for the Coyotes, according to head coach Amy Williams.

"My concern is on the other end," she said. "That's nagging at me; feeling like we're not polished where we need to be defensively.'

In moving to 11-0 at home this season, the Coyotes dished out at least 20 assists for a second consecutive game. They finished with 26 on 29 baskets Friday.

"As long as you're in the right spot in the right time, we're going to give you the

ball," Seekamp said. Junior Tia Hemiller added 12 points for the

Coyotes, who shot 51 percent, while senior Raeshel Contreras, junior Kelly Stewart and sophomore Bridget Arens all added nine points.

The story, though, was the performance of Loeffler.

"She's a senior and she just knows and understands the way this thing goes," said Williams, who credited Loeffler's preparation for a zone defense.

"She's playing the way we know she can."

Just about everything went USD's way on offense in the first half. Seventeen assists on 19 baskets which resulted in 56 percent shooting — led to


After the Mastodon made a surge early in the second half to get within 12, the Coyotes scored 14 straight to balloon the margin.

Up by as many 27 points with 4:43 to play, the hosts couldn't find a way to put away the Mastodons. The visitors scored 23 of the game's final 30 points to make things respectable. "Coach said in the

locker room, when we get tired, we have those kinds of lapses," Seekamp said. "We just have to keep working on those kinds of things.
