USD men's basketball bounces back with big road win; Hosts NDSU on Wednesday night

DENVER—South Dakota used a 22-2 run in the second half to flip the script on Denver and held on late for a 74-69 victory Sunday at Magness Arena. Both teams are 1-1 in the Summit League standings.

South Dakota (7-9) trailed 44-33 with 16 minutes to go, but scored 22 of the game's next 24 points to take a 55-46 advantage less than six minutes later. Tyler Larson and Casey Kasperbauer scored 10 points each during the rally. Larson led South Dakota with 22 points. Kasperbauer made 4 of 5 three-pointers and finished with 15 points – all in the second half.

Kasperbauer's fourth triple gave USD a 67-55 lead with 3:35 to go. Denver closed within a point following two free throws from Brett Olson with five seconds left. Larson answered with two free throws with 4.2 seconds left to make it 72-69. The Pioneers threw away the ensuing inbounds pass and D.J. Davis' bucket at the buzzer sealed the win.

Olson led all scorers with 24 points. He had 12 in the first half and scored seven in the final 90 seconds to make it close at the end. Jalen Love and Marcus Byrd added 13 points for the Pioneers (7-8), who are picked to finish second in the Summit League's preseason poll.

Coyote big man James Hunter helped USD jump out to a 10-2 lead and scored eight of his 12 points in the first half. South Dakota shot 41 percent from the field (23 of 55), made 7 of 13 treys and 21 of 27 free throws.

Denver shot 53 percent from the field (23 of 43), but had nine second-half buckets. The Pioneers were held to three offensive rebounds all game and were outscored on second-chance points 18-2.

Kasperbauer picked up three fouls early and played four minutes of the first half. His first shot of the game was a three-pointer with 13:33 to go that brought South Dakota within three, 46-43. Larson stole a pass and scored and Kasperbauer hit his second trey to give USD the lead for good, 48-46, at the

12:21 mark.
Larson hit a 3 and
Denver coach Joe Scott
picked up a technical foul
at the 11-minute mark.
Kasperbauer made 1 of 2
technicals and buried
another three-pointer on
the possession that followed
to make it 55-46. The Yotes'

largest lead was 61-48 with eight minutes to go.

South Dakota missed three free throws in the final 37 seconds to give Denver hope. The Pioneers had the ball trailing by three points with 14 seconds left, and the Coyotes intentionally fouled Olson with five seconds left.

South Dakota has won four of its last five overall. The Coyotes next take on Fort Wayne Saturday at 6 p.m. (CST) in Fort Wayne, Ind. Fort Wayne (7-7, 0-1 Summit heading into tonight's home game against IUPUI) is the preseason favorite to win the Summit League.

A Look Back at Omaha, Summit League Opener

Omaha flipped the script Friday night and the University of South Dakota Coyotes ended up in the role of supporting actors in a Summit League men's basketball season opener at the DakotaDome.

With things going well, a nice lead in hand, and the defense doing its due diligence, the Coyotes held a consistent double-digit lead during the tail end of the first half and the opening scenes after halftime.

Then the adventure turned into a horror show as Omaha erupted for 57 second half points and clamped down on the USD shooters late to pull away for a stunning 86-77 win.

USD (6-9, 0-1) saw its second three-game winning streak snapped and dropped a pivotal conference home game with five of their next six Summit contests set for the road.

The Coyotes play at Denver Sunday with play set for a 2 p.m. tip.

"That was interesting,"
USD head coach Craig
Smith said. "We thought at
halftime we controlled the
pace and tempo and really
got it going late in the
second half to make a good
run. It felt like we should
have been up 18 or 20 at
half. In the second half we
had really good looks we
missed and we settled for
jumpers as well. We settled

"I made some mistakes. We should have played more 2-2-1, 2-3 zone to slow them down because they felt like a wave going downhill. We looked comfortable when we were up 12 and that's not what you want. We were happy

exchanging baskets instead of putting the screws to somebody. Let's finish them off...we didn't do that tonight."

The Coyotes were led by the 17-point efforts of Brandon Bos and Tyler Larson and 11 points from Casey Kasperbauer.

Omaha (7-6, 1-0) wrapped the game with 47 points over the last 15 minutes and finished the second half at a 61 percent shooting clip.

CJ Carter led the victorious Mavericks with

they hit some tough shots for sure but we can't give up 57 points in a half, that's on us," Bos said. "I give them credit for some of the shots they made, but we can't let teams go on runs like that and expect to win games.

"I thought we did a good job in the first half holding them to 29 points. But giving up 57 points on our home court..."

Down a dozen at halftime the Mavericks came out trying to push the pace as their athleticism is want to do.

The problem was they were unable to finish consistently enough or at junctures where easy shots should have been made and the deficit didn't see a dip for the first five minutes of the second half.

Combine that with the Coyotes not being bashful about running with the Mavs and the Coyotes led 49-39 at the first television timeout.

"We always want to be on the attack and that was something we were definitely doing at the start of the second half," Bos said. "We starting taking tough shots and rushing threes inside of trying to go inside. We weren't able to get the ball moving and get flowing. We got stagnant and they worked in their favor.

"Their confidence rose

Omaha did get things tighter around the collar with a 10-6 run that pulled them within six just north of the 11-minute mark,

Then a CJ Carter trey pulled the Mavericks to within 55-52 moments later.

The Mavs held a fivepoint cushion but the Coyotes would not relent and a Tyler Larson offensive putback, hoop, and harm at 4:40 to play to take the lead back at 71-70.

But that was where the hope would end.

she placed in a tie for 7th with a 7.65.


The Tanagers had the opportunity to finish the meet on their strongest event – the floor exercise.

"The enthusiasm in the gym is high and hopeful as we move into the second half of the season," said Fitzsimmons.




