we do that on a nightly basis and we do get our season turned around, at some point you need a game and a week where you can look back and say 'that was the turning point.'

"Maybe tonight was that turning point."

Williams led the Tanagers (5-7) with 17 points, Schwasinger and Andre added 15 points apiece, Johnson chipped in with 12 points and Manger contributed a rugged ninepoint effort.

It took a whopping 86 seconds for the Tanagers to set throne as they, rolled out to a 10-0 lead behind two silky 3-daggers by Johnson and Schwasinger.

The Trojans got their bearings and kept things competitive despite the Tanager offensive mojo hovering at Mach-6 as the Tanagers led 22-17 after one quarter of play.

Sophomore guard Williams' play was the perfect metaphor for a longtime caged lion let loose in a pen full of fresh meat.

"I felt like I had to be aggressive and I felt our team needed to play together," Williams said. "The last couple of games we have come out and sized up our opponents before deciding if we were going to play hard. I felt like I needed to give us a boost and come out of the gates so we didn't wait around.

"(West Central) had some open lanes and once I got into the lane they'd cut them off and I'd hit the shooters a couple of times."

Williams' hungry play on both ends would lead to sweet dips and drives through the lane and 3bombs as the Tanagers led 34-23 with just over three minutes left before halftime.

Right down the line and starting with Cooper at the point guard position we came in struggling," Drake said. "It was nice we hit some shots early and got a nice start to the game. That triggered a smooth roll into the fourth as Johnson buried two trevs and the Tanagers enjoyed a 61-43 lead with 4:55 left in the game.

Throw in a little inside muscle with Manger and this case was closed: the Tanagers were guilty of bringing the beat down.

Tanager girls see Trojans pull away

It wasn't for a lack of effort by the Tanager girls, but more a case of the offense not clicking and the Trojans just being deeper and savvier enough to capitalize when the opportunities presented themselves and send Vermillion to its third straight loss.

"West Central has four guards who are aggressive and looking to score and looking to make things happen," Vermillion head coach Jon Brooks said. "We have gone through a stretch where we aren't scoring a lot of points and maybe doubt starts creeping in a little bit. You have got to be able to break through it. We have a lot of season left.

"When you play good teams the one thing you can't do is be outworked and

that's (what happened tonight).'

Haleigh Melstad led Vermillion with 10 points while Hailey Freidel and Autumn Barnett chipped in with six points apiece.

"We tell each other game against a tough team that we play we have to be all together as a team," Barnett said. "Right now it's just a rough patch. We all have confidence in each other. We just have to trust each other, know what each of us can do, and seeing what other people can do.

We are head down and dribble. Brooks has told us that a hundred times, we just don't know how to fix it.'

Brooks agrees that this area is a concern.

"We work hard on practice with everybody that when they get the ball they have to look up and look in because you have to be a threat offensively," Brooks said. "If you got something you have to be aggressive and take it."

West Central (10-2) finished the first quarter with a 15-10 lead but not before a 7-0 Tanager run helped cut a 13-3 deficit to a manageable spread after eight minutes.

The freshman Melstad helped Vermillion's cause with seven points in the opening quarter to counter a balanced Trojan attack.

The second quarter saw both teams trade some tough shots but a late 7-4 run by West Central gave the visitors a 28-19 edge at the halfway point.

West Central came out of the locker room hitting the boards hard and their defense played with a little more vigor to help

themselves to a 36-19 lead at the 4:54 mark of the third quarter.

Without a senior on the floor the Tanagers made a run to pull within 12 and had ample opportunity to pull within single figures behind a scrappy attitude and a whole lot of attitude.

West Central came in carrying a medal of pedigree and they flashed that in the waning moments of the period to take a solid 43-27 cushion into the final quarter.

Vermillion gave a solid effort in the fourth quarter but the bounces they needed, the kind rims demanded, and the required defensive stops were too far and few between as the Trojans flexed their muscular lead and never let go to cruise to the relatively easy win.

Last Friday night the Tanager girls fell 38-30 at Lennox. Kasey Jensen led the way for Vermillion with 12 points while Shanel French contributed seven points in the defeat.
