State Historical Society names Governor's Awards for History

Four individuals or groups are being recognized by the South Dakota State Historical Society for their efforts in preserving state history by receiving Governor's Awards for History.

The award winners include Lonis Wendt of Vivian, Julie Ortman of Sioux Falls, Kingsley M. Bray of Manchester, England; and South Dakota Public Broadcasting (SDPB), based in Vermillion.

The awards will be presented at a luncheon on Saturday, May 21, during the annual history conference of the State Historical Society in Pierre.

"These people are all to be commended for their efforts at preserving our state's history," said Gov. Dennis Daugaard. "Because of their work, our past will be kept alive for future generations."

"We are pleased to give out these awards," added Jay D. Vogt, director of the State Historical Society. "These are just a few of the shining examples of how people across the state and beyond are helping us in our efforts to promote, nurture and

sustain South Dakota history."

Wendt is the individual award winner. His efforts have brought South Dakota history alive for thousands of South Dakotans of all ages. Wendt is the historian of the Encounters on the Prairie-Central South Dakota Chapter of the Lewis and Clark Trail Heritage Foundation. He has spent more than 50 years preserving such segments of state history as the Fort Pierre to Deadwood Trail, the Fort Bennett Trail and the Vivian area.

Ortman was named the 2011 History Teacher of the Year. She teaches at Memorial Middle School in Sioux Falls and uses a wide variety of hands-on methods and technologies to engage her students in learning about history. A previous VFW and Alcester-Hudson Teacher of the Year and a finalist last year for Sioux Falls School District Teacher of the Year, Ortman said she teaches "to make every day an adventure that students can't wait to take!"

Bray is the winner of the Herbert S. Schell Award for best article in the previous

year's South Dakota History, the State Historical Society's award-winning quarterly journal. His article, "Before Sitting Bull: Interpreting Hunkpapa Political History, 1750-1867," appeared in the Summer 2010 issue of the journal.

SDPB is the organizational award winner, and is being recognized mostly for its work in capturing last year's State Capitol Centennial events through the mediums of TV, radio and online. SDPB TV producer Stephanie Rissler created the awardwinning documentary "Our Statehouse: A Capitol Idea," that looked at the history of Dakota Territory, the fight for the capital city and construction of the Capitol building. SDPB has created several other documentaries about South Dakota history

Sanford School of Medicine on of nation's 'most popular'

The Sanford School of Medicine of The University of South Dakota is one of the nation's most popular medical schools, according to the U.S. News and World Report.

In an analysis of yield data by U.S. News, the Sanford School of Medicine ranked as the seventh most popular medical school with a yield percentage of 76.1 percent. A school's yield is percentage of admitted students who opt to enroll in the program. At USD, 54 of the 71 accepted students chose to attend the school in the academic year beginning in 2010. The University of Kansas Medical Center ranked No. 1 on the list with a yield percentage of 82.2 percent, topping the University of Nevada-Reno School of Medicine (81.6

percent). The Sanford School of Medicine ranked slightly ahead of the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill School of Medicine (74.4) percent), the Medical University of South Carolina School of Medicine (73.9 percent) and Michigan University College of Osteopathic Medicine (73.1 percent).

Criteria in selecting the nation's most popular medical schools was based on a U.S. News survey of more than 140 medical schools for the publication's 2010 survey of research and primary care programs. Schools self-reported data regarding their academic programs and the makeup of their student body. U.S. News uses most of this data to rank schools for its annual Best Medical Schools rankings; the data can also be used for other lists.

Two faculty members honored for excellence in teaching at USD

The University of South Dakota honored two of its faculty for excellence in teaching at the 2011 Spring Commencement ceremony on

Joseph Vitt and Michael Allgrunn are the 2011 recipients of the Belbas-Larson Awards for Excellence in Teaching. They were recognized at USD's 124th Spring Commencement and each received a \$5,000 tribute, a framed certificate commemorating their accomplishment and a commemorative medal. The Belbas-Larson Award for Excellence in Teaching is the highest honor USD bestows upon its educators.

Honored in the tenured category, Vitt is an associate professor in the department of chemistry. He received his bachelor's degree in chemistry from St. John's University (1987) and his Ph.D. in analytical chemistry from Iowa State University (1991). His teaching interests are in the areas of general and analytical chemistry, and he is also active in promoting

undergraduate chemical education research. Vitt came to USD straight from his graduate work at Iowa

Recognized in the tenure-track category, Michael Allgrunn is an assistant professor in economics at the Beacom School of Business. A faculty member of USD since 2006, Allgrunn received his bachelor's degree from Brigham Young University (2001), and his master's degree and Ph.D. from Michigan State University, all in economics. He teaches classes in subjects such as econometrics, labor economics, game theory and public finance. In addition, he is very involved with undergraduate research in economics. Allgrunn came to USD straight from Michigan State, where he researched labor economics and taught courses in both labor economics and

microeconomic theory.
