Vermillion's VFW 13-14 Teeners will open their state tournament at Humboldt at noon today (Friday) against Spearfish after clinching the Region 1A championship with a win over Irene last Thursday.

The other game in the upper bracket pits Madison 14 against Sioux Falls Christian at 2:30 p.m. The evening quarterfinal bracket has twotime defending champion Tyndall against Big Stone City/Ortonville at 5:30 p.m., following by Humboldt 14 vs. Irene/Wakonda. The evening session will be preceded at 5 p.m. by an opening ceremony featuring all eight teams in uniform.

The state tournament will be played out to six places. If Vermillion wins its opener, its next game would be at 5:30 p.m. Saturday. If Vermillion loses to Spearfish, the next game would be at noon Saturday. Sunday's schedule has a fifth-place game at noon, a thirdplace game at 3 p.m. and the championship game at 6. There will be no seventh-place game.

Vermillion and Irene clashed in last Thursday's Region 1A championship game at Elk Point with both teams assured of berths in the state tournament. After Irene took a 1-0 lead in the top of the first inning, Vermillion took charge and removed all drama from the situation.

A five-run first inning gave Vermillion more of a lead than starting pitcher Billy Mount needed. He cruised through the six-inning

In the sixth, already leading 11-2, Vermillion got its chance to end the game prematurely when Miller led off with his second hit of the game. Two

outs later, pinchhitter Wyatt Markee drilled a basehit into right field, scoring Miller all the way from first as the team reached the 12-2 advantage that ended the tournament.

Mockler also had two hits in the game for Vermillion, which went through the regional unbeaten at 4-0.

The district Class "A" tournament was scheduled to begin Thursday night with

Yankton at Brandon Valley and the Red Sox at the Renner Monarchs. The losers of those two contests will play at 8 p.m. tonight (Friday) at Prentis Park with the loser being eliminated and the winner advancing to the state tournament at Mitchell next week.

Thursday night's two winners both automatically advance to the state tourney, but they will nevertheless play each other at Prentis Park at 2

p.m. Saturday to determine state tourney seeding.

The Red Sox played one of those intra-district rivals, the Yankton Tappers, evenly last week, finally losing to the Tappers 6-4 in 10 innings. Down 4-1 after 7 1/2 innings, the Red Sox scored one run in the eighth and two in the bottom of the ninth to send

the game into extra innings before Yankton scored two in the 10th for the win.

The Red Sox outhit Yankton, 14-12. Nick Wieder was the starting pitcher for Vermillion with Casey Neumann relieving in the sixth and being tagged with the pitching loss.

The previous night the Red

Sox trimmed the Sioux City Saints, 10-5, as Nate Olsen got the pitching victory after seven innings of work. Bobby Lee threw the final two innings and got the save. Reese Steckler had a double

# REGARDING NOTICE

Due to the extremely dry conditions the Clay County Board of Commissioners has passed a Resolution Banning all Open Burning within the County effective immediately, July 19, 2012 until further notice and would like to remind all residents as to the pertinent laws regarding burning. South Dakota law provides that it is a Class 1 misdemeanor for a person to negligently allow a fire to spread. It is also a Class 1 misdemeanor to burn without giving due caution to the weather conditions.

In addition to criminal sanctions, a person who negligently causes a fire to be started or spread is liable for all fire suppression and extinguishments costs.
