bid for fire station roof repair

The Vermillion City Council awarded a \$30,000 bid toward the first phase of repairing the roof of the fire station.

The action was taken at the council's regular meeting Monday night.

City Engineer José Domínguez said the city received three bids for the project, ranging from \$30,610 to

The low bid came from Winkler Roofing of Sioux City, IA, and this is the one the council accepted.

The 2014 budget included \$60,000 in

the Second Penny Fund for the project. Council member Steve Ward asked Domínguez if he had any concern about the low bid being so much lower than

"It was a wide range, but we talked to (Winkler)," Domínguez said. "They seemed pretty comfortable with it. ... They didn't really have any concerns whatsoever.

"Actually, they were wondering why the other ones were so high," he said. The city's main fire station is located at 820 N. Dakota St. and has two roof portions, an upper and a lower.

"Over the past five years the city has been experiencing leaks during rain events in the upper roof area,"

Dominguez said.

Although the leaks have been fixed, due to their number the city had the building inspected by roofing contractors to determine its condition.

"All of them had essentially the same

concern, that the roof – especially the upper roof – had some issues with the fabric pulling off the flashing and some ... other protrusions through the roof," Domínguez said.

The contractors also estimated the lower portion of the roof has an additional two to five years of life left, he

The fire station was built in 2000. "The roof had a 10-year warranty and no manufacturer defects, or installation errors, were found during the inspection," a council agenda memo reads. "Due to the warranty expiration and no manufacturer defects found at installation, we could not request that a portion of the cost be paid by the roof manufacturer or the contractor that installed the roof."

A timeline as to when work will be completed on the project was not given at Monday's meeting.
