

# Yankton College to honor alumni at reunion

heard of it (the musical), but we got the movie from the library and watched that, and we kind of got a basic idea. After learning more about the musical, I knew I wanted to try out for Oliver."

Director Callie Hisek discovered during auditions that Ella possesses all of the qualities needed to successfully portray the orphan boy. "I was looking for someone who could be both outgoing and shy at the same time, because Oliver has to play both of those," she said. "It was really important when I was looking at all of the kids that were auditioning, to find someone who would have the strength and the maturity, because this is not an easy show for a child.

"I was looking for someone who has not only all the different facets of Oliver, but also someone who has the talent that Ella has," Callie said. "I knew that she has been in a lot of shows, and I knew that she would be mature enough to handle it, so I took all of that into consideration as well."

Ella's petite size, as well as her talent and past theatre experience, all combined to help her land the lead role. "Oliver has to be to underfed, Oliver has to appear a little weak – you have to think about the size (of the actor) and what they have to offer," Callie said. "Ella shows all of those qualities, and it was nice to hear her and see her.

"Anthony (Burbach, the musical director) and I had faith that she would be able to sing the parts, and Katherine (Reimler, the choreographer) knew that she would be able to pick up the dance steps.

She's a perfect fit," Callie said.

"Everyone has been working hard," Ella said. "There's a lot of lines to memorize, but I've got those down."

"Things are falling into place. It can be really hard because we do a lot of stuff piecemeal. We jump around a lot in rehearsal, so sometimes it gets a little scary and frustrating, but we had our first run-through last week," Callie said. "Things are looking pretty good. I think we're in a good spot heading into Tech Week."

That's the term Callie uses to describe how more and more aspects of the musical are scheduled to fall into place beginning next week.

"Tech Week is when we start adding all the lights and sounds and costumes and hair," she said. "Up to this point, we're rehearsing with some of the props, we have some of the scenery and eventually we're going to get all of it. Tech Week is when we start putting everything together."

This summer's experience, Ella said, isn't all that unique when compared to her past theatrical experiences. She doesn't view her role as being more significant than that of the musical's supporting cast.

"It's not quite the same, yeah, but it's not really that big of a difference to me," she said. "It's just a lot of fun, especially because it's summer, and you get to hang out with all of your friends."

Her decision to audition for "Oliver!" came easily. All she had to do was recall the great time she had participating in the Vermillion Community Theatre's 2013 summer musical.

"I just remember that in the last year, it was a lot of work but it also was a lot of fun, and it was worth coming back," Ella said.
