CLAY COUNTY COURTS

JUDGMENT OF CONVICTION CRI. 14-123

Mark G. Green was charged with Count 1: Grand Theft contrary to SDCL §§22-30A-1 & 17(1). The offense occurred on or about the 17th day of December, 2013, in Clay County,

South Dakota.
On the 16th day of April, 2015, the Defendant was arraigned on said Indictment. Mark pled not guilty to Count 1: Grand Theft contrary to SDCL §§22-30A-1 & 17(1).

On the 11th day of June, 2015, before the Honorable Cheryle Gering, Mark pled guilty to Count 1: Grand Theft contrary to SDCL §§22-30A-1

The Judgment of the Court found Mark guilty of Count 1: Grand Theft contrary to SDCL §§22-30A-1 & 17(1).

Mark was sentenced on the 11th day of June, 2015, before the Honorable Cheryle Gering. The Court pronounced the following sentence:

•Court expressly finds aggravating circumstances exist that pose a significant risk to the public and require a departure from presumptive probation under SDCL §22-6-11, in that the Defendant has a past criminal history, was previously incar-cerated yet continued to commit criminal acts, which present a danger to the well-being of the public. However, despite the finding of these aggravating circumstances, the Court at this time exercises its discretion to suspend the penitentiary sentence imposed;

 Defendant shall pay court costs of \$104.00 and transcript fees of \$94.60:

•Defendant pay restitution in the amount of \$1,296.00 in Clay County, South Dakota, and \$1,229.44 in Codington County, South Dakota as set forth on the restitution form(s)

 Defendant shall repay Clay County for all of his court appointed attorney's fees, namely \$153.00 in fees and expenses of Jason Rumpca, in addition to the fees and expenses of Linda Kogel that are approved by the

•Defendant be imprisoned in the South Dakota State Penitentiary for a term of two (2) years, there to be kept, fed and clothed according to the rules and discipline governing said institution;
•Defendant shall receive

credit for time served, namely, 180 days in Minnehaha County and 57 days in Clay County, for a total of 237 days credit;

•The penitentiary time imposed in this case shall run concurrently with any penitentiary sentence imposed in Minnehaha County CRI: 13-4846; •Two (2) years of the peni-

tentiary sentence shall be suspended pursuant to SDCL §23A-27-18 upon certain terms and conditions.

JUDGMENT OF CONVICTION CRI. 15-148

Tonia Krieger was charged with Count 1: Unauthorized Possession of Controlled Substance, to-wit: Methamphetamine contrary to SDCL §22-42-5; Count 2: Unauthorized Ingestion of Controlled Substance, to-wit: Methampheta-mine contrary to SDCL §22-42-5.1; and Count 3: Unauthorized Distribution of Schedule I or Schedule II Substance contrary to SDCL §22-42-2. . The offense occurred on or about the 6th day of March, 2015, in Clay County, South Dakota.

On the 25th day of June, 2015, Tonia Krieger pled guilty to Count 1: Unauthorized Possession of Controlled Substance, to-wit: Methamphetamine contrary to SDCL §22-42-5. The State dismissed Count 2: Unauthorized Inges-

tion of Controlled Substance, to-wit: Methamphetamine contrary to SDCL §22-42-5.1; and Count 3: Unauthorized Distribution of Schedule I or Schedule II Substance contrary to SDCL §22-42-2.

The Judgment of the Court found Tonia guilty of Count 1: Unauthorized Possession of Controlled Substance, to-wit: Methamphetamine contrary to SDCL §22-42-5.

Tonia was sentenced on the 25th day of June, 2015, before the Honorable Cheryle Gering. The Court pronounced the following sentence:
•Defendant be imprisoned in

the South Dakota State Penitentiary for a term of three (3) years, there to be kept, fed and clothed according to the rules and discipline governing said institution;

•Defendant shall receive credit for 17 days served;
•Defendant's sentence


