## Vermillion among 13 districts to receive bonding authority under federal stimulus plan

Thirteen South Dakota structed. school districts, including the Vermillion School District, have been approved for \$29 million in bonding authority to raise funds for construction or rehabilitation projects as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment

"This new bonding program gives school districts a remarkable opportunity to complete school modernization projects during tough economic times," said Gov. Mike Rounds. "These projects will be a boost to the construction industry and help keep people at work in communities across South Dako-

The ARRA, or federal stimulus initiative, created a new financial instrument called the Qualified School be returned to the book and Construction Bond. With this new instrument, school districts basically receive interest-free loans to complete modernization projects, and

their lenders get tax credits. QSCB funds may be used for two main purposes: (1) to construct, rehabilitate or repair public school facilities; (2) to acquire land on which school facilities can be con-

Twenty-four school districts applied for bonding authority under the federal stimulus program.

The state Department of Education plans to allocate 2010 bonding authority for the remaining 11 districts as soon as it becomes available.

### **Three Years: Estate Still** Not Closed!

A woman dies with a \$350,000 estate. Her heirs wait for a distribution. They are patient. How patient should they be? How long should it take to close an estate and distribute its assets?

"Is there a law that an three years before it can be closed?" asked a caller to the senior legal helpline. "It has been three and a half years since mom died and all we get from the lawyer and the bank are excuses.

"The bank blames the lawyer and the lawyer blames the bank. What can we do?"

The caller's sister is the personal representative of the estate. "She's frustrated; we're all frustrated. We are a close family and there is no disagreement about who is entitled to how much. The lawyer had an illness and that may be part of the prob-

I advised the caller there is no fixed time required before an estate can be closed. A final account and petition for distribution can be filed when there are sufficient funds available to pay all debts and taxes and the time for filing creditors' claims has expired.

In the caller's state, a final account does not have to be filed if all persons entitled to distribution of the estate sign estate must remain open for a written waiver of account or a written acknowledgement of receipt of their share of the estate. If the estate cannot be closed within one year – or 18 months if the estate is required to file a federal estate tax return – the personal representative must file a verified report on the status

of the estate. The status report must state the condition of the

"We assume the longer the estate is open the more time the lawyer will spend working on it and the higher his Is that a correct assumption?" she asked.

In some states fees for both the attorney and the personal representative are set by statute. For example, California provides for four percent of the first \$100,000; three percent of the next \$100,000; two percent of the next \$800,000 plus one percent of the next \$9 million, plus one-half of one percent of the next \$15 million. In the caller's state the fees must be deemed "reasonable" and approved by a court.

What may not be reasonable in this case is the delay in closing the estate.

registered during the semester. Amanada Granaas and Christopher Merrigan, both of Vermillion, were named to the dean's list.


