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PREPARING FOR THE WORST

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South Dakota Department of Transportation officials advise that bridges along the Missouri River are structurally sound and not in danger from the impending high water. A contract was awarded last week to add and extend riprap that protects the embankment under the Newcastle-Vermillion bridge that crosses the Missouri near Vermillion. Similar protective measures have already been done at the Missouri River bridge between Pierre and Ft. Pierre. The Discovery Bridge and Meridian Bridge in Yankton are not experiencing any problems with erosion at this time. Secretary of Transportation Darin Bergquist said, "as a precautionary measure, crews will continue to monitor all bridges along the Missouri River in order to mitigate any issues with erosion of the embankments." The work on the South Dakota side of the bridge, done last Friday, was just part of the efforts made in the last week, from Pierre down to Dakota Dunes, to prepare for record releases of water from the Missouri River mainstem dams. USD, SDNG, local volunteers join forces as river rises

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The arrival of summer usually marks the beginning of a slow period for the University of South Dakota

However, the threat of flooding along the Missouri River has made it a center of prevention efforts, with members of the National Guard and regular citizens joining together to help those in need.

"I think we actually have more people on campus right now to take care of than we do during the normal year, and the summer help is gone because we don't usually have this many people," said USD President James Abbott.

It all came together very quickly, said Bob Fitzpatrick, director of USD's Marketing and University Relations Department – with an e-mail sent to available staff and students the morning of Tuesday, May 31.

"Within only a few hours, between the people we sent out to Dakota Dunes and Yankton, and the people who were doing stuff on campus, we had close to 100 people already getting their hands on this," he said. "It's a grassroots operation, but at this point we've probably had more than 300 people get involved."

Also arriving that day were more

than 200 members of the National Guard, who have since taken temporary residence in campus dorms when they're not busy at the future flood sites.

"Help was needed in preparing their rooms and getting food together for

them," Fitzpatrick said. "Aramark is feeding them, but we have volunteers who've been serving breakfast and dinner to them, and also putting together box lunches for them."

Daugaard: South Dakotans 'scrambling' ahead of floodwaters

Dam near Pierre released an average of 85,000 cubic feet of water per second (cfs). On Friday, that level approached 100,000 cfs. By the end of this week, it promises to reach 150,000 cfs.

Previous to this, the record release was 59,000 cfs.

"Pierre/Fort Pierre for the last week have been racing," said Gov. Dennis Daugaard. "About 2,000 homes have been evacuated as the Oahe rises, and even as I speak there are heavy equipment operators trying to build levees to protect the

University of South Dakota last Friday, after which time he went to Dakota Dunes, another site of the approaching flood.

Of the approximately 1,100 homes in Dakota Dunes, "probably 800 to 900 of them" are in danger of flooding, Daugaard said.
