"My second thought was celebrating with Derek," Buell said. "We've been through so much together, and it was great to enjoy that with him."

Not only did Buell's winning mark tie the Division I national meet record, it was USD's firstever championship at the D-I level.

The school's last track national champion was Gayville native Emma Erickson in the 800-meter run at the 2008 D-II outdoor meet.

Three months ago, however, Buell was not even sure if she would be able to finish out her outdoor season.

She injured her left shoulder at the Texas Relays in late March, and later discovered she had torn a ligament. There was a decision to be made.

"We talked about maybe shutting down the season and getting the surgery over right then," Buell said. "We decided that if I wasn't at 14 feet by regionals, we would shut it

"Luckily that didn't happen." Thanks to some intense ehabilitation in the USD training room, Buell was able to not only qualify for the West

Region Preliminary Round three weeks ago but finish fifth - though at 13-feet-5.5. As she has during her Coyote career, Buell was able to put

everything together on the nation's biggest stage. In Eugene last Friday, she was successful on seven of her first 10 attempts. Her third and final jump at

14-7.25 was do-or-die time. Clear the bar and walk away a national champion, or miss and take second place. "I tried to stay calm; I said a

little prayer, too," she said. "I just

had to focus on my technique." Buell was far from the only highlight for USD at the national meet. Vaulting teammate Emily Grove (So.) finished seventh and Megan Glisar (Jr.) was sixth in the high jump — giving the Coyotes

three first team All-Americans. The USD women finished 18th in the final team standings with 15 points, while Cody Snyder — the first Coyote men's athlete to qualify — took 21st

place in the discus. Asked about USD's rise in the Division I track world, Buell pointed to the influence of the coaching staff as reason to believe the Coyotes aren't done

racking up national titles. "I think we'll have more to

follow," she said. The USD women's squad was the fourth-best non-BCS school in the national meet, finishing ahead of such schools as UCLA, Oklahoma, USC and Auburn.

"It shows that we're able to compete against the bigger schools," Buell said. "Don't count us out, we have great athletes, and great coaches who know what to do."

Tune Band, L.A. saxophonist at Gayville Saturday

The Public Domain Tune Band and talented guests, including Los Angeles saxophonist Roger Neumann, Omaha drummer Joey Gulizia, Sioux City piano player Terry Brooks, and vocalist Becca Gehm, formerly of Vermillion, take the stage in Gayville on Saturday, June 15, at 8 p.m.for "Gayville Hall's Big Time, Two-Hour Jazz Jam II."

The show, a reprise of last season's most popular concert at the Gayville music hall, according to producer Doug Sharples, will feature "tunes that our parents and grandparents loved," including songs by such great American songwriters as Fats Waller, George Gershwin and Duke Ellington.

The Tune Band was founded as a duo in 1979 by vocalist and guitarist Nick Schwebach and fiddler Owen DeJong, both of rural Wakonda, after a rockabilly band they played in broke up. The duo

started performing early 20th-century tunes they learned from 78 r.p.m. records and older musicians.

Schwebach's vocals remind audiences of iconic and authentic vocalists of the early jazz and pop era like Louis Armstrong and Jack Teagarden. Gehm, still in her 20s, will add a fresh, female spin to old-time classics she'll sing.

Larry Rohrer, who is part of Schwebach-and-DeJong's five-piece band Poker Alice, plays bass with the Tune Band, and USD jazz professor C.J. Kocher, who has performed behind pop stars, in big bands and jazz combos, plays saxophones.

Returning guest star Roger Neumann brings the "Big-Time" to the show. He plays the tenor, soprano and baritone saxophones, flute, and clarinet and has performed with Woody Herman, the Lee Castle/Jimmy Dorsey band, Ray Anthony, Les Brown, Bob Crosby, and the Beach Boys.

Neumann's saxophone playing was heard on the soundtrack of the 2013 Hollywood movie version of lack Kerouac's On the Road. His music has also been featured in the Showtime movies "Atlantis," "Three Men and a Little Lady," and "Mumford." He appeared on-screen in the theatrical movies "La Bamba," "My Favorite Year," and "For the Boys."

Born in North Dakota, raised in northwest Iowa, and educated at Morningside College in Sioux City, Neumann was honored at the 20th Annual Jazz Awards in Los Angeles in 2002, receiving "the jazz composer and arranger of the year" award. He has written music for Buddy Rich, Count Basie, Ray Charles, Ray Brown, and

Jerry Garcia. He has also written arrangements and compositions for the T.V. series "The Young and the Restless," "Moonlighting," "Hollywood Housewives" and "My Favorite Martian."

Drummer Gulizia has played with the Nebraska Jazz Orchestra, the Nebraska Brass, and the Omaha Symphony. He has performed in Japan, Europe and on many cruise ships in the Caribbean.

Pianist Brooks, a Sioux City native, has performed in Europe and earned many Los Angeles and Las Vegas credits in the shows of Bill Cosby, Whoopi Goldberg, Don Rickles and many other stars before returning to the Midwest.

National Guard hosting 29th annual exercise

The South Dakota National Guard is currently hosting its 29th annual Golden Coyote training exercise in the Black Hills. The training began June 8 and will wrap up on June 22. The exercise is designed to provide military units with relevant training opportunities in support of overseas contingency operations and homeland

Created in the mid 1980s by the South Dakota National

defense.

Guard, with the cooperation of the National Forest Service and Custer State Park, this year's Golden Coyote training exercise will allow more than 3,500 service members to conduct combat support and combat service support missions in a realistic training environment and provide valuable services to the public.

There will be 55 military units representing 11 states and four foreign nations participating in the exercise and

from multiple branches of military service – Army, Navy and Air Force – working together to create an invaluable training experience.

Participating units train on their equipment and employ tactics, as well as complete various engineer projects that help improve the forest and infrastructure of many local communities.

Local residents receive numerous benefits of the many engineering projects being conducted during the training exercise. Units transport timber cut in remote areas to those who can use it as firewood, identify hazardous wilderness areas and make them safe for public use, and re-surface local roadways that have fallen into disrepair.

In addition, individual units are able to participate in numerous warrior training tasks and battle drills, such as urban combat operations, land

navigation, first aid, casualty evacuation, and day and night convoy operations. This provides a valuable opportunity for units to train on skills needed for any future overseas deployment.

Missions for the 2013 Golden Coyote training exercise are conducted throughout the Black Hills and the surrounding area, both in local urban areas and remote wilderness sites.

USD announces 2013 Hall of Fame Class

Five individuals including two sisters and one team will comprise the 2013 Henry Heider Coyote Sports Hall of Fame Class announced Monday by University of South Dakota's athletics department. The induction ceremony will take place Oct. 12 during USD's Hall of Fame Weekend.

Cross country runner Joel Fenske, football player Jim Glogowski ('97, '05), basketball player Natalee (Heisler) Anderson ('99), basketball player Angie (Heisler) Kissock and swimmer Tara (Magnuson) Wyckoff ('97) are included in the 2013 class as is the 2000 men's outdoor track and field team which will be recognized in the special achievements category.

The group brings the Hall of Fame totals to 282 individuals and 11 teams. An abbreviated bio of the 2013 Hall of Fame Class follows:

Joel Fenske, cross country (1995-98) Fenske remains the only four-time All-American cross country runner in program history. With Fenske in the lineup, the Coyotes won three North Central Conference championships, two North Central Regional titles and a national championship in 1997. South Dakota placed third at nationals in 1998 and finished no lower than ninth during Fenske's four seasons. Individually, Fenske placed in the top 25 at all four

national meets. His best finish was seventh in 1997.

Dr. Fenske attended USD for five years. He graduated from Northwestern Health Sciences University in 2003. He is the owner of Kingsway Chiropractic in Lakeville, MN.

Jim Glogowski, football (1992-95)

Glogowski was an All-American linebacker for the Coyotes who remains the program's seventh-leading tackler with 298 stops. As a senior in 1995, he was named North Central Conference Most Valuable Linebacker after leading the Coyotes with 91 tackles including 21 for loss and an 8-3 record. Glogowski was a four-year starter at USD. He played strong safety as an underclassman before

transitioning to linebacker as a junior. Glogowski served as a member of the USD coaching staff from 2004-07. He is set to begin his fifth season as head football coach at Simpson College in

Indianola, IA. Natalee (Heisler) Anderson (1992-96)

Anderson was a three-year starter and two-time, first-team All-North Central Conference honoree as a Coyote. She is the 16th-leading scorer (1,132 points) and eighth-leading rebounder (691 boards) in program history. Anderson's best numbers came as a junior when she averaged 17 points and nearly 10

rebounds per game. An injury wiped out her senior season after just 10 games. She played alongside younger sister Angie for two seasons.

Anderson is a child mental health practitioner at Counseling Services of Southern Minnesota in St. Peter, MN.

Angie (Heisler) Kissock (1994-98)

Kissock was a four-year starter and two-time, first-team All-North Central Conference honoree as a Coyote. She averaged 16 points and 10 rebounds as a senior, and 12 points and 11 rebounds as a junior. She remains the 17th-leading scorer (1,081 points), the third-leading rebounder (889) and has the fourth-most steals (213) in program history. Kissock broke an NCC record with 214 boards in league play during the 1996-97 season. She played alongside older sister Natalee for two seasons.

Kissock is a personal wellness teacher and women's basketball coach at Schools of Eastern Carver County in Chaska,

Tara (Magnuson) Wyckoff (1992-96) Wyckoff delivered 10 All-America performances in four seasons with the Coyotes. Her most prominent accomplishments came in the breaststroke where four times she placed in the top eight at the national championship meet. She was the

national runner-up in the 100-meter breaststroke as a senior in 1996. That same year, Wyckoff placed fifth in the 200-meter breaststroke. She held program records in both events upon graduation and still maintains the second-fastest times in both events.

Wyckoff is an account executive at RBA, Inc. in Minneapolis, MN. 2000 Men's Outdoor Track and Field

Team Under the direction of head coach

Dave Gottsleben, the Coyotes won their first North Central Conference championship in 35 years and went on to place third at the national championship meet.

The conference title ended North Dakota State's 13-year reign on top of the standings. Senior Matt Hoyt was named NCAA Division II Male Athlete of the Year for Outdoor Track after placing in the top four in three distance events at nationals. Junior Tom Green took second in the 100, third in the 200 and anchored USD's All-American 400-meter relay team. Ryan Finley, Pat Belling, Aaron Dykstra, Andrew Neugebauer, Steve Schmidt and Garrett Schramm all placed in the top eight at nationals to earn All-America status.

Bertram was back to the mound Tuesday against Hartington and turned in another impressive performance. Bertram's line of one run on three hits and eight strikeouts was especially important as the Vermillion offense was quiet through the

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first three innings. But with the fourth inning came a return to form for the Post 1 offense, ignited by a two-run homerun by Meierkort. Meiekort's homerun, which bounced off the top of the wall in left field before finding a home beyond the fence, was one of two hits on the night for the Post 1 catcher to accompany two runs and five crucial RBI's.

The Vermillion 1-3 hitters (Bertram, Settles, Huska) combined for seven of the team's ten runs and pushed the home team to a comfortable lead in the late innings.
