Hovden Named Summit League Coach Of The Year

ELMHURST, Ill.—South Dakota men's golf coach Nick Hovden has been named the Summit League Men's Golf Coach of the Year, as announced by the league office

Hovden collects his first accolade after leading the Coyotes to their first Summit League title and NCAA Division I Regional appearance. South Dakota fired a tournament-low round of 292 on the third day to eclipse the leaders and take

The Coyotes had a 299.77 team stroke average for the year and claimed four tournament titles. In addition to the Summit League Championships, the men were victorious at the Jackrabbit Fall Classic, Atchafalaya Intercollegiate and Bradley Invitational.

Hovden's women's team also won a title at the Creighton

In five years the helm of the program, Hovden has coached four all-Summit League golfers, two academic all-Summit League honorees and three America Sky all-

Wilkes, Eichkorn Finish Seasons **At NCAAs**

EUGENE, Ore.—South Dakota juniors Hunter Wilkes and Amber Eichkorn wrapped up their seasons at the NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships held at Hayward Field in Eugene, Ore.

The dark horse duo entered the final round after strong performances at the NCAA West Preliminaries in Austin, Texas, two weeks ago.

Wilkes ended up in 18th place in the pole vault. She cleared the opening height of 13 feet, $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches on her third attempt, but missed all three attempts as the bar rose to 13-9 1/4. Wilkes finishes off her outdoor season with a Summit League title, a new career best of 13-11 that ranks third in school history and honorable mention All-America

Stephen F. Austin's Demi Payne won with a vault of 15-5, breaking Coyote alumna Bethany Firsick's meet record in the event from 2013.

Eichkorn finished 20th in the 10,000 meters with a final time of 34:55.33, clocking 5:17.45 through the first mile. Eichkorn concludes her outdoor season with Summit League titles in the 5,000 and 10,000 meters, four new school records and honorable mention All-America honors.

Fogg To Represent Canada At FISU Games In South Korea

South Dakota junior Abigail Fogg has earned a roster spot on Canada's 2015 Development Women's National Team. The 6-foot-4-inch center redshirted the 2014-15 season after transferring from American University. She has two seasons of eligibility remaining.

Hailing from Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, Fogg will represent her native country at the International University Sports Federation (FISU) Games July 5-13 in Gwangiu, South Korea.

"I could not be more excited," said Fogg. "It has been my dream since I was young to compete for my country and I am grateful to have this opportunity. I definitely would not be here if it were not for the love and support of my family, friends, teammates and coaches. I am blessed to have such great people in my life and such a great opportunity ahead

Fogg was one of 22 athletes invited to a tryout for the team, held June 6-9 at the University of Toronto's Goldring Centre. Since making the roster, Fogg began a 10-day training camp at the Goldring Centre under head coach Fabian McKenzie. The squad will travel to China for an exhibition tournament June 22-28 prior to the FISU Games.

Snyder becomes All-American at NCAA Championships

EUGENE, Ore.—South Dakota senior Cody Snyder earned All-America status in the discus at the NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships at Hayward Field in Eugene, Ore.

Snyder launched the discus 193 feet, 8 inches on his second throw to take the lead of the first flight. The mark held onto sixth place headed into finals. Snyder's fifth throw landed near the 197-foot mark, but his foot stepped out of the ring resulting in a foul. Snyder ultimately finished seventh with a mark of 193-8.

The Lake Andes, S.D., native is the first Coyote from the state of South Dakota to earn All-America honors at the NCAA Division I level. Snyder becomes the program's 13th All-American.

Snyder ends his collegiate career as a first-team All-American, a two-time Summit League discus champion, a member of three Summit League team titles and a career best throw of 194-6.

Cole Feterl followed the gold medal action from his computer at home in Lennox, watching — like millions of people around the world — the 2013 World Archery Youth Championships from Wuxi, China.

He was 14 years old. Just young enough to miss the cut-off for the biennial event. But certainly old enough to know what it would mean to represent the United States.

"I remember watching these on YouTube," Feterl said. "And I always wanted to be at one of these."

Mission accomplished. Feterl, the lone South Dakotan in the field, helped lead the United States to a team gold medal Saturday morning at the World Archery Youth Championships in Yankton.

Paired with Dane Johnson and Daniel O'Connor, Feterl helped Team USA beat Great Britain by 12 points in the Compound Cadet Men's

The finals were held on a specially-designed course out in front of the Easton Yankton Archery Complex, but the general setup was much like Feterl watched online two years ago.

"It's cool to see it in person, but even better to actually be up there," he

When the United States team of 24 archers — 12 men, 12 women — was announced two months ago, Feterl knew he would have the label of 'lone South Dakota archer' for the

But he never let any potential pressure get to

"It's a huge honor to win a gold, especially here," Feterl said.

At 16 years old, Feterl was the oldest of his team: Johnson (from Indiana) is 14 and O'Connor (from Georgia) is 15.

The trio had advanced their way all through the Compound Cadet Team bracket during the week, setting themselves up for an appearance in the finals.

They were then matched up against Great Britain. The United States team built up a 12-point lead after three of four ends, and later captured a 225-213 victory.

"One we got a lead, we just coasted and quit worrying," Feterl said.

The United States did have the advantage, though, when it came to crowd support. The WAYC being
