Though Vermillion's local winery, Valiant Vineyards, has wine tasting, tours and other events throughout the year, the summer presents the oppor-

tunity to host life-changing events. "Right now we're really focusing on our wedding season," said Adrienne Lewis who has worked at the vineyard for over a decade. "We have lots of weddings throughout the summer. That's really fun.

"We have a wedding this weekend which is definitely fun," Lewis told the Plain Talk last week. "She's a very creative bride too so it's fun to see her vision of her wedding and make that come together for her. She's actually doing her ceremony here and the din-ner and reception and everything."

According to Lewis, the use of the vineyard as a wedding venue is popu-lar not only for locals but those who have long since moved on.

"A lot of the times it's people who have some roots in South Dakota and they end up traveling," she said. "We had a couple from Australia. The groom had family ties in Vermillion so they actually had people who flew in from all over the world to come to the wedding. That was pretty exciting. We had another family that had family in the area and they planned the whole thing from Texas where they actually lived

At the close of wedding season, the winery looks forward to an exciting annual event.

'Our main event of the summer is the South Dakota Wine Fest," Lewis said. "This is our thirteenth year. The whole room is wine tasting and we have live music out back and we do a cooking with wine demonstration. All kinds of fun things.

The event even includes an amateur wine-making competition.

The vineyard also hosts celebrations for other major events like anniversaries, graduation parties and reunions year round.

Exciting events aside, Lewis pointed out the most important thing to understand about the winery's main product.

"You could never know everything about wine," she said. "It's just about the experience and the trial and error. That's something I talk about with people on a daily basis when they come into the winery and do wine tasting.

South Dakota wild grapes. That's our signature wine and the one we've got the most recognition in the wine industry. We actually export that one to China and Paris as well. Pretty exciting or a little South Dakota winery."

According to Lewis, all the wine is made on site using a variety of grapes and methods.

"We have our own vineyard and we also have other local growers that we buy from," she said. "That's really great because then it becomes an added value to our agriculture in South Dakota. We bring in a little bit to supplement. We hope we will have enough someday where we don't have to do that.

According to Lewis, the time it takes to produce a bottle of wine varies widely.

"Some wines could be finished from harvest in like nine months and some age a lot longer like the wild grape we age for six years," she said. "We plan ahead and figure out what we might need for the years ahead.³

Modern agricultural technology has made things a lot more interesting according to Lewis.

"It's an exciting time to be in the wine industry in the Midwest because they do keep coming up with new and better varieties of these grapes all the time," she said. "It makes it really fun."

The fun doesn't necessarily stop at grapes either.

You can make wine out of just about anything really," she said. "When we do our amateur competi-
