# USD's Snyder Named Outdoor **Field Athlete Of** The Year

South Dakota senior thrower Cody Snyder was named the 2015 Summit League Men's Outdoor Field Athlete of the Year as announced by the league office on Wednesday.

A native of Lake Andes, S.D., Snyder earned firstteam All-America honors after launching the discus 193 feet, 8 inches on his second throw at the NCAA Championships. Snyder threw 190-5 to win the Summit League Championship in the discus and break a 23-year-old meet record. He also earned all-league honors in the shot

put. Snyder posted a career best discus throw 194-6 at the Bobcat Invitational, which broke the school and state records in the event. Snyder also threw a career best 57-5 ½ in the shot put at the NCAA West Preliminaries.

Snyder is the third Coyote to earn Athlete of the Year honors this year. Junior hurdler Teivaskie Lewin was named the Indoor Track Athlete of the Year and senior thrower Kyle McKelvey earned Indoor Field Athlete of the Year.

# **Teeing Off For Coyote Athletics**

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Coaches, fans and community members came out to support Coyote athletics Saturday afternoon at the inaugural Charlie Coyote Open at the Bluffs golf course.

In past years, the fundraiser has been held as a tour in cities around the state, but this year the athletic department decided to hold it right here in Vermillion.

"It's the first time we've had the golf out here in Vermillion in sometime," said Jon Schemmel, the senior associate athletic director for development at the University of South Dakota. "What we're really trying to do is to get people, not only back to the university, but back to the city of Vermillion and let them have a good time and remember what it was like when they went to school here."

The tournament was held using a scramble format with a shot gun start and attracted 31 teams with four golfers each.

"For the first time moving down to Vermillion, we're pretty proud of that and we just hope it'll grow," Schemmel said.

The university is looking to grow the tournament and combine the tour aspect with a main event held in Vermillion each year.

"What we're doing now is one big event in Vermillion that our staff is working and the University is putting on. Then we're asking other (sites) if they would like us to come out, (like) to Rapid City or Yankton or Sioux Falls or anywhere else. We're asking volunteers to engage and put events on and we'll bring coaches and staff at that point," Schemmel said. There were also games at number of the holes, like a longest putt, a

to get to know the children and families around the community.

"I just wanted to get to know the kids in the area and get to work with kids as much as I could to give me that experience," Green said. "It's really rewarding to see the kids' faces after they get a good hit or they get a good catch and you're like 'good job!' and their faces light up.'

Green is also a former softball player who had a 12-year career and played through high school.

At the younger ages, the coaches are looking to teach the players about safety techniques when it comes to the sport, as well as being part of team and encouraging teammates.

'We want to make sure that they know safety when it comes to baseball, so we're really going over fundamentals of, not only throwing, but how to catch a ball," Chambers said. "That's where we see most of our small injuries, kids not being able to catch it. so we really go over fingers up, fingers down, how wide to catch the ball and making sure you're in the middle of it, things like that."

Not all the coaches attend USD, but rather some graduated from Vermillion High School (VHS) and return for the summer to coach in the same place they grew up playing.

Caleb Miller, a former Vermillion Baseball Association player who now attends Brown University in Providence, Rhode Island, has returned for his third year as a coach.

"I just love Vermillion baseball," Miller said. "I played at this age on this field when I was five and six years old, and the whole 12 years I played baseball here I absolutely loved it. So, it's kind of giving back.'

Miller has had the chance to coach different age groups over the last two summers, and this year is his first with the 5-6 year olds.

"At this age group there's a lot more herding, like having to tell them 'set the bat down, run this way'. Instead of just letting them play and critiquing little things. It's more babysitting, but it's also a lot more fun because they improve way faster than the people at other ages," he said.

The t-ball and rookie teams have finished up with skills training and begin game play next week.

"The coaches will have more responsibility (during games) because it'll be just two of them on field managing the game," Stanton said.
