Artistic flair used to name streets at Bliss Pointe

There was a split – but ultimately successful – decision regarding street names in the Bliss Pointe development at Monday's city council meeting.

As a result of the changes, what was known as West Clark Street will become Rockwell Trail, Spirit Mound Circle will become O'Keefe Circle, Frontier Street will become Joplin Street and Pioneer Street will become Wilder Road.

Another street that has not been platted may be changed from Bison or Buffalo Trail to Frost Trail.

City Manager John Prescott said the changes result from the October 2012 Talent Attraction Survey and Workforce Housing Study, which said Vermillion should try to develop itself as a regional center for the arts, literature and music.

"We thought we had a unique opportunity with Bliss Pointe to recognize some famous artists,

painters (and) writers of our era (with these changes)," Prescott said. "What we selected for this was 20thcentury artists who had relatively simple names to spell, they would fit on a street sign and they would be somewhat recognizable."

Council members who voted for the changes were Kelsey Collier-Wise, Tom Davies, John Grayson, Clarene Meins and Kent Osborne.

"No" votes came from Steve Ward, Howard Willson and Dennis Zimmerman.

Willson said there could be a problem regarding the point at which Cornell Street and Rockwell join, as Rockwell curves into Cornell.

"It makes it a little hard for people to understand how you can drive halfway into a project on one street and four feet later be on another street," Willson said. "I also understand that because Rockwell will make that curve up, numbering becomes a problem."

Willson suggested that "as long as you're calling it Rockwell Trail, you

could number the sequence coming off West Clark and number it all the way consecutive back over to Stanford Street, and it wouldn't be any more confusing than having two streets running right into each other with different names."

Prescott said the city has looked at beginning and ending Rockwell on Stanford.

"This is a relatively long street," he said. "We're talking (approximately) 140 housing units that would be a part of it."

The city also is trying to keep its current numbering scheme, in which the number on a house is reflected by how far west of Center Street it is, Prescott said.

"It's not a perfect system, but those are the reasons we looked at it," he said. He also pointed out that there are

several other locations in the community where similar situations can be found, including Ash Street, Catalina Avenue and Sunset Drive.

Citizens cautioned about sites that charge for driver licensing help

PIERRE – South Dakota's Driver Licensing Program is asking its customers to be cautious of Internet sites that charge for assistance with driver licensing services.

While citizens must pay a fee to obtain or renew a South Dakota driver license, the information about the program and staff assistance with questions

or problems is provided without charge, said Cindy Gerber, director of the Driver Licensing Program.

"We recently had a contact from a citizen who was charged \$26.99 by a website for online renewal," Gerber said. "While the charge is for access to the site and their recommendations on what forms to use from our

(South Dakota Driver Licensing Program) site, the person could have gotten that information from us without the charge."

Citizens may access the official Driver Licensing Program site at http://dps.sd.gov/licensing/ driver_licensing/ or by calling (800) 952-3696.

The Driver Licensing Program charges a \$20 fee for a new license or renewal of a license, but information and assistance is without charge, Gerber said.

"We aren't saying other sites are doing anything wrong, but we do want our citizens to know they can obtain forms and assistance without paying," she said.
