JACKS LEAVE NO DOUBT IN BIG SEMIFINAL WIN **OVER SDSU MEN**

SIOUX FALLS — As Tyler Larson left the court in the waning minutes of a lop-sided loss, he embraced head coach Craig Smith.

The senior shared an extended moment with his coach, finally patting him on the head before making his way to the bench.

There was a sense of finality to the scene, albeit in a disappointing setting.

'As far as basketball and life, I've been through a lot, and I really look up to him a lot," Larson said after a 78-65 loss to South Dakota State in Monday night's Summit League

Tournament semifinals in Sioux Falls.

Watching Larson and fellow senior Brandon Bos both playing for their third USD coach — leave in such an emotional way, it came across as a kind of torch passing.

Perhaps the two main reasons the Coyotes were even in the semifinals handing the reins over to Smith, who was wrapping up year one with the program.

A first year that could have gone one of two ways: The returning players not buying into a new coaching staff's scheme, or coming together and taking the program to new heights.

'Sometimes when you're new to a program, sometimes the hardest guys to coach are the seniors," Smith said. "They're rooted in their ways.

"It's hard to change the stripes of the zebra."

Smith had come to USD with much fanfare, having spent two years with Tim Miles at Nebraska before their stints together at Colorado State.

When he was hired nearly a full year ago, Smith made clear that his expectations were high: talk of reaching the NCAA Tournament wasn't going to be motivation, it was going to be an expectation.

'When we first met him, we were a little skeptical," Larson said. "After a couple weeks, we saw he's the real deal.

"That he was going to turn this program around." And Smith did that in



Vermillion Boys Watch Hoop Season Come to Early End

It was two different games within the same one and two contests that completely flipped the switch over six days.

The last two games between the Vermillion Tanager boys' basketball team and the Canton C-Hawks had a little bit of everything over 64 minutes as they battled it out the second time in less than a week Thursday night in a Region 4A quarterfinal contest.

The host, No. 3 seed Tanagers came out on fire and scored 20 points in the first quarter only to score that same amount over the last 24 minutes and No. 6 Canton would pull away for a 51-40 victory six days after being blitzed 66-47 in

Vermillion (9-12) saw its season come to an end while Canton moves on to the semifinal round.

"In the fourth quarter we put ourselves in a position where we got down three possessions and (Canton) could dictate things," Drake said. "We knew it would be a tight game in the fourth. We just hoped we would be in that position up three possessions in the fourth quarter and dictate things.'

Cooper Williams led Vermillion with 12 points while Jeremiah Johnson added nine points and Brandon Mockler chipped in with eight points off the bench. Canton (7-14) used a combination of a

man and zone defense against Vermillion as and trapped the corners and high and low posts but like that mattered any. The Tanagers banged away from

outside including two big 3-bombs by Brandon Mockler and another by Matt Ouellette as both subs came up big early.

Then Cooper Williams drilled a sweet running three from 30-feet as time expired on the first eight minutes and Vermillion led 20-15 heading into the second quarter. The Tanagers finished the first quarter

with five 3-pointers. "We did hit some shots and you have to

be able to hit perimeter shots," Drake said. "They started man and then basically when to zone midway through the first. We may have settled a little bit too much from the outside." Deep outside shooting wasn't the

problem for Vermillion, but its inability to hit midrange shots, to start the second quarter allowed Canton to pull ahead with back-to-back arc-huggers to go up 21-20

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
