MARCH 28 AT POLAR PLUNGE

Every day doesn't hold an opportunity to jump into a tank of icy cold water in support of a good cause, but people will be "Freezin' for a Reason" on Saturday, March 28, as they raise funds for local and state Special Olympics teams, through the Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special

Olympics South Dakota. "We have two special olympics chapters in Vermillion that we raise funds for and part of the proceeds go to the state office as well," said Officer Jon Cole, one of the event's organizers and the assistant director of LETR-South Dakota. "The state office puts on the events, such as the Summer Games coming up in May that are happening in Brookings this year."

The event will take place in downtown Vermillion in front of the Old Lumber Company.

"In years past, we've done it at the High School, this year the community decid-

ed to change that. The idea is to bring it to downtown Vermillion, a more centralized location, and a venue that is going to get more traction and awareness," said Cole. "The High School is a great place, but there isn't as much traffic going by the High School."

The Polar Plunge will begin at 4:00 p.m. Participants can register online at www. plungesd.org or at the event, beginning at 3 p.m. Participants must raise a minimum of \$100 to take the leap.

Some participants raise money to take the plunge while they are waiting in line to register.

"I've seen people raise the money in the amount of time it takes to do the registration," Cole stated.

For those who are less bold, there's even a option to raise money as a participant "too Chicken to Plunge", or they can donate in support of another plunger on the website.



"It's easy to register online. It's a safe, secure website to use a credit card on," said Cole, noting that same-day registration is also easy. "People can just show up at the event and if they

"It's a family-friendly event and we encourage people to bring out their families and watch the people plunge," said Cole. "There will be several people in costumes and just having fun with it."

There will be a Post-Plunge party at the Old Lumber Company. Members of the Special Olympics teams in the area will be attending.

"The Post-Plunge Party is time for everyone to gather after the Plunge, to mingle and to eat," Cole said. "It will give people a chance to interact with the athletes, with the people who raised the money, and with the people who actually work with Special Olympics as
