Before making the short drive to the airport for a flight home, coach Nick Hovden gathered his golfers together in a California hotel room early Monday morning.

The Coyotes had a vested interest in the NCAA Division I men's golf selection show.

A day earlier, Hovden's group captured its first Summit League championship in a comeback effort, earning the program a berth in the NCAA Regional Championship – its first regional appearance since 2003 and first at the D-I level.

"It really hasn't hit yet," Hovden said by phone Monday night, as he was driving back into Vermillion.

As they watched the selection show on the Golf Channel, the Coyotes learned they will be one of 14 schools competing in the Bremerton, Washington, regional on May 14-16.

"It was surreal to see the University of South Dakota up there with all those big schools," Hovden said. Much like the USD

Tournament selection show a year ago, the golfers saw "South Dakota" appear on the screen next to some of the nation's prestigious schools — with the likes of South Carolina, Washington, USC, Baylor, Iowa State and Michigan. Such company might

have meant pressure for the Coyotes, but instead, they're relishing the opportunity, Hovden said.

It was a similar mindset the previous three days for USD at the Summit League tournament in Lompoc, California.

The Coyotes entered the third and final day of action Sunday 11 shots behind leader Oral Roberts and two shots behind second-place Oral Roberts. Eleven shots in one day. That wasn't exactly a position where the Coyotes could be thinking championship, unless

everything went their way. "We did a great job executing our game plan which was to stay patient," Hovden said. "All we wanted to do was put ourselves in

position to make a move that

last day." The Coyotes shot a tournament-best 292 on Sunday and made the full comeback by edging Oral Roberts by three strokes (909 to 912) for the title.

Samuel Matthew, a two-time first team All-League selection, finished third for USD, while teammates Cody Seal (fifth), Matthew Swanson (tie-ninth) and Jordan Rykal (tie-17th)

"They stayed mentally tough, and they worked their butts off," Hovden said. "It was fun to watch all that hard work pay off." At the NCAA regional, the Covates will be golfing

the Coyotes will be golfing alongside four top-20 teams, including South Carolina (No. 7), Washington (No. 14), USC (No. 16) and Baylor (No. 17). The other teams include UAB, TCU, Iowa State, Sam Houston State, Michigan, UC Davis, VCU, Pepperdine and Cleveland State.

The top five teams and the next five individual golfers not among those teams will advance to the NCAA Championship on May 29-June 3 in Bradenton, Florida.

Girls Golf Readies For Regions Marathons Fulfill **Love Of Travel**

Most people consider it an accomplishment to complete one marathon, but the Vermillion school district's business manager Sheila Beermann has her eye on 100.

"I'm at 77 marathons and I hope to get to 100 by the end of next year," Beermann said. "I started with one or two or three a year and now I run about 15-20 a year. I run one about every three weeks."

Beermann has been running since she was a child and started marathons after her own children grew up and moved away. It helps combine her love of traveling and her love of running.

"I love to run, I love to travel so I can put the two together," she said. "I love people. I just love meeting people and what their makeup is. But I think more, I love the challenge to see how far I can take myself, how far I can push myself."

Beermann has run a marathon in each of the 50 states and has even run three in three days starting in Maine

then New Hampshire and ending in Rhode Island.

"You're just exhausted at the end, but you've pushed yourself to the limit," she said.

Now, Beermann is looking to complete all the major marathons.

"I've done New York, Boston and Chicago, so the other three majors are the London, Berlin and Tokyo," she said.

Most recently, Beermann completed the London Marathon on April 26. "London was awesome," Beermann said.

"I took the tour (of London) the day before so I got to see a lot of the places that I ran by on Sunday. It was supposed to rain, it didn't rain. It was really cool."

She was one of about 40,000 runners to participate in the marathon that chooses it's runners on a lottery system.

'lt's one of the hardest (marathons), besides Boston, for United States people to get into," Beermann said. "You can apply and apply and apply and very seldom do you get picked.'

For Boston, runners need to qualify by running another marathon in under a certain amount of time. The times vary based on age and gender. Beerman has qualified twice in her age group by running a sub four-hour marathon.

Beerman said her most memorable

> marathon was the second time she ran in Boston because she had the opportunity to join Team Hoyt.

"I ran it with Team Hoyt and it was their 30th (Boston Marathon)," Beerman said. 'That was one of my slowest because we actually walk them in. It was so hot, it was 91 degrees.'

Team Hoyt is a father-son duo with son, Rick, a quadriplegic, pushed by father, Dick, in a wheelchair. The pair has run over 1,000 races together including over 30 Boston Marathons. The Hoyts ran their last Boston Marathon together in 2014.

But, Beermann doesn't set her sights on speed. She runs marathons for the experience and the opportunities to travel to new places.

"I^{*}m looking more for travel," Beermann said. "The people that you meet when you travel for marathon are awesome. They're all different ages, different intent. I stop and take pictures on the way, I don't go for speed I go for the journey."

Fewer marathons are scheduled during the summer months, but Beermann has races scheduled during the summer in Minnesota, Iowa and South Dakota. She also just ran in the Lincoln Marathon this past weekend in Lincoln, Nebraska.

"It has been an awesome journey," she said. "And part of it, is just to see how tough you can be and finish a marathon."
