# With Falcons

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Shortly after practice had ended Sunday out at an Atlanta Falcons rookie minicamp, Matt Huffer was asked to bring his bags and meet with the coaches.

Sure, the former University of South Dakota offensive lineman was confident he had done enough to impress the coaches, but was he getting cut? Had his NFL career ended before it really began?

"I wasn't sure what was going to happen," Huffer said by phone Sunday night. "I had already talked to my agent, and he said there was a chance they would sign me."

Sitting across from two coaches, Huffer soon realized it was good news.

"As soon as he said pack my things up and go to the hotel, I knew they were giving me the opportunity," Huffer said.

The 6-foot-6, 300-pound offensive tackle from Cedar Rapids, Iowa, was one of two players signed Sunday by the Falcons after the weekend rookie minicamp. Huffer and former USD teammate Steve Tellefsen (Minnesota Vikings) had been offered free agent contracts after the NFL Draft.

For Huffer, he had performed well enough to impress the coaches at the minicamp, which featured 40 players. He and Jonathon Mincy, a cornerback from Auburn, were the only players signed by the Falcons.

"It was a great experience seeing all these guys from all the big time schools and playing against them," Huffer said. "It was definitely something that made me realize that this level isn't a joke.

"It's different than seeing it on TV." And he'll be seeing plenty of that level.

Huffer signed a 3-year contract, but it's not guaranteed, meaning he'll still have to make the team out of training camp later this summer. Huffer will start working out with the Falcons today (Monday) and will participate in

organized team activities (called "OTAs"). "It'll all happen really fast," Huffer said.

As it has for a pair of USD teammates.

Former Coyote standouts Tom Compton (Washington Redskins) and Tyler Starr (Falcons) are already with NFL teams, while a handful of others over the past couple years participated in team camps.

"It's a great university, and the coaching staff knows what to do," Huffer said. "As long as you listen to their tips and to what they tell you, it's all up to you."

Even if, as in Huffer's case, the size might not appear to translate to the next level.

"They (Falcons) told me they thought I played very

The Tanagers we held scoreless going into the fifth inning and were down five runs, but came back with six in the frame.

"Up until the fifth inning we really weren't doing a lot of things very well," said head coach Jason Gault. "I think our heads were down. I think we were feeling a little defeated (after Friday's loss)."

Nate Robertson led off the fifth inning

by getting on base after being hit by a pitch that brought up Jake Odens who singled.

(Robertson) takes a dose for us, gets down to first and then we do a nice job of hitting the ball right side. (Odens) slaps a line drive over the top of the second baseman's head and that kind of starts it," Gault said. "From there we get contagious. Hitting starts to get contagious, nobody wants to make that out and that's when it starts to get fun."

Carter Kratz then hit an RBI double scoring Robertson, followed by another RBI double by Joe Miller that he stretched into a triple off a throw to home. Miller

The next batter, Jack Brown, hit an RBI single and a few batters later Robertson hit a routine fly ball with the bases loaded that was dropped by the Dakota Valley second baseman and scored Travis Weber and Brandon Mockler for a 6-5 lead.

"It goes to show you that all it takes is one inning to get back into something," Gault said.

Vermillion scored its final two runs in the sixth inning off RBIs from Brown and Mockler.

"The talk we had after the game was that we have to have the ability to stay positive through those tough moments," Gault said. "We can't hang our heads and we have to pick our teammates up because before you know it, it goes from 5-0 to 5-4 in a hurry. So, I was proud that they really buckled down."

Brown went 3-for-4 in the game with two RBIs and Mockler went 2-for-4 with one RBI.

Odens had the start on the mound and pitched four innings giving up five runs on six hits with two walks and one strikeout.

"I thought Jake had a decent outing. We didn't play great defense behind him," Gault said. "You throw hard, you do your job and that's getting ground balls and you get some guys behind you that aren't fielding it for you and that's a tough situation."

Kratz replaced Odens to start the fifth and went three innings giving up two hits with five strikeouts.
