the plans for the Prentis Park Project.

which was determined to be valid and meet the 5 percent requirement of voters needed and was determined to be valid.

According to city manager John Prescott the decision of the voters will greatly affect the direction the council will take in regards to the Prentis Park Project.

"The current estimate of the project is that it will cost \$5.25 million," Prescott said. "The council designated \$1 million of reserves from the general fund, \$1 million of the second penny fund reserves and estimated that we would need to seek a bond of \$3 million to finance the project."

The city had hoped to place the bonds this summer with the assumption that the 5 percent malt beverage mark-up would be used to help cover the anticipated average annual debt service of \$222,127.

A malt beverage mark-up

is provided for in state statute and allows a city to add up to 5 percent on cost and freight of malt beverages, which according to the last year of data available of 2007 would have generated \$116,600 per year.

Prescott said that using the costs associated with malt beverages at the golf course, which the City manages, for one brand of beer an 18-pack has a cost of \$12.40 or \$0.69 per can. With the mark-up the cost for that can of beer would be \$0.72, or three cents higher. For the most expensive bottled beer sold at the golf course, it would be equivalent to a six cent increase per bottle, which the providers would be required to capture in their sales costs. Likewise for keg costs, the most expensive keg would incur a six cent per glass increase.

During Monday's meeting it was noted that the public approved the 5 percent mark-up overwhelmingly.

Prescott said should the mark-up now be voted down by voters, it would force the city council to greatly reduce the plans for the Prentis Park Project.

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Austin First Graders Enjoy Final Field Trip

The final few days of school are always exciting, but for the first grade students at Austin Elementary in Vermillion, Tuesday was, literally, a field trip day.

The students, teachers, and their parents were invited to the farm of Erlan and JoAnn Olson for a Farm Day event that exposed them to life on a farm.

JoAnn Olson said that the reason she and her husband enjoy have the students visit and learn about life on a farm.

"The students really seem to enjoy it," she said. "It isn't so terribly far out of town, so it is something they can do. When they are here they are raring to go and are excited to see everything."

Olson said teacher, Jen Law, is the driving force behind the day's events.

"We have a lot of first grade standards that we are trying to hit with the different stations the students visit today," Law said. "This ties right in with our curriculum: learning about the animals and their habitats, the current and past equipment, how the plants and animals grow, it just groups all of it together."

She added that the students enjoy the hands on aspect of visiting the farm.

"They get to learn about different animals raised in this area and the meat produced in the area," Law said. "They learn what meat comes from which animals. Also talking about machinery from the past and the present and getting to compare them, learn how we didn't have big machinery years ago is neat for the kids to get to see."

Law said that for many of the students this will be their first experience with a working farm.

"A few of the kids may have been on a farm, but not ones that had animals or machinery on them," she said.

Law noted that the people doing the presentations for the students are all experts in their respective fields that donate their time and expertise to showing the students what goes on at the farm.
