"It's amazing the support that we had locally and out of state," Sherlock said. "We're really grateful and thankful for the opportunity for them to come and help us the way they did and then to have this opportunity to win the \$5,000 was just over the top."

During the day of service employees from Vermillion's Alleviant branch scrubbed CFCF inside and out and helped prep one side of the building for a future outdoor nature classroom.

Only the finishing touches remain according to Sherlock.

"Since the weather has not been the greatest it has been a challenge to get back out there and get things done but as soon as we have some nice days we're going to get out there," she said. "I'm glad we didn't plant any seeds for our garden because we had a couple nights of hard freezes last week. They wouldn't have survived. My goal once we have some nice days is to get out there and finish it off." Since the outdoor project is near completed, Sherlock has other plans for the grant money. especially for the summer as the volunteers from the University of South Dakota are on break.

"When the university is out for the summer there's a lot of things that we don't have help with, primarily outdoor stuff like pulling weeds," Sherlock said. "I'd love to have people help one day a week for an hour or so or whenever they would like to come help us maintain that outdoor classroom. Eventually I want to get that outdoor nature classroom certified and one of the big things is having the community involved in that. It's open for anyone who's interested in volunteering."

Other volunteer jobs include office work, cleaning and maintenance inside and out so the building looks nice and is safe for the children.

Volunteers helping out while children are present are required to undergo a background screening and sign confidentiality papers as dictated by the center's state licensing.

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Hovorka said any of the general assemblies are open to the public and she invites any who are interested to attend.

"Tuesday's morning assembly will feature Marty Jackley, S.D. Attorney General," she said. "Tuesday evening's assembly will have a self-defense demonstration led by SW2, Shane Toupal of the SD Army National Guard. This is something we started last year and the girls just really seemed to love it. So, we are excited to bring it back."

Other speakers throughout the week include: S.D. State Representative Peggy Gibson, S.D. State Representative Mike Stevens, S.D. State Senator Jean Hunhoff, Dr. Michael Roche, USD Criminal Justice Professor, Kim Olson, Central S.D. Director for Senator Mike Rounds, Kim Malsam-Rysdon, S.D. Secretary of Health. Due to congress being in session this week, both Rep. Kristi Noem and Sen. John Thune are expected to visit with the attendees, but a time has not been set.

"This is just a great event that the community of Vermillion should be proud to host," Hovorka said. "The partnership with the University and the local law enforcement officials is vital to the success of the programs we offer the girls while they are in Vermillion."

Inauguration of the new ALA South Dakota Girls State governor will take place at 8 p.m., Friday, June 5, in Aalfs Auditorium, with Madison Mead, 2013 Girls State governor, providing the keynote address. The Girls State Chorus, under the direction of Ethel Cooper, of Springfield, will present a patriotic concert prior to the inauguration ceremony. Other Girls State activities for the week include general assemblies, talent auditions, invited speakers, campus tours and various presentations and meetings. A college/career fair is also scheduled for Wednesday, June 3, in the Muenster University Center concourse.

Hovorka said one other project that the attendees will be a part of during the week is the 2015 community project, which is required by the national Girls State program.

"We ask all participants, staff and volunteers of the Girls state for their support of Berakhah House in Sioux Falls," she said. "The Berakhaha House was formed by veterans' stakeholders to address the needs of homeless and struggling veterans in our community."

nity." She said the services provided through the program are contracted through the Sioux Falls Veterans Affairs Healthcare System with the goal of reducing homelessness among veterans.

Each Girls State participant is asked to bring donations that will then be given to the home.

Some items needed include: shower curtains, twin sheets, alarm clocks, hygiene products, gift cars, household items and similar items.

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"A big chunk of the \$5,000 will go to finishing the last rooms in the new addition," she said.

"The children and the families are so thankful for it," Sherlock said. "They know that it will be a benefit to our community as well. We have had a high number of people interested in preschool care in fall and finishing off that room will enable us to take those kids in. Without that grant it would take a lot of fundraising efforts to finish that room."

Sherlock said she hopes the Alleviant employees will not be the last to volunteer their time to the center.
