First nationwide test of **Emergency Alert** System is Nov. 9

> The Clay County Office of Emergency Management has announced that on Nov. 9 at 1 p.m., the federal government will conduct the first nationwide test of the Emergency Alert System (EAS). The test will last up to three and a half minutes. During this period, regularly scheduled television, radio, cable, and satellite shows will be interrupted as the system is being tested. The local emergency management office would like to ensure that the larger public are aware that this event will be just a test, and not a real emergency alert.

> The test is being conducted by Federal Emergency the Management Agency (FEMA), the Communications Federal Commission (FCC), and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), as part of their ongoing efforts to keep the nation safe during emergencies and strengthen our resilience against all hazards.
