# Tanager volleyball season ends at district tourney

The Vermillion High volleyball season ended with a 5-15 record after the Tanagers lost in the semifinal round of the District 8A tournament last week.

The Tanagers fell at the hands of eventual district champion Dakota Valley in a 3-0 match in North Sioux City. The Panthers, ranked third in the state, won a close first set, 25-20, then dominated the action in the remaining two sets, 25-11 and 25-8, to advance to the finals where they defeated Elk Point-Jefferson.

Sarah Hughes-Berheim had

11 digs for Vermillion, Megan Olson nine, Josie Huber eight, Mariah Larson five and Melissa Chickering five. Mackenzie Huber recorded four kills, Katie Herrera four and Olson three. Olson, Josie Huber and Hughes-Berheim had two service aces apiece while Larson had eight set assists.

In the regular-season finale the Tanagers lost to Elk Point-Jefferson, 3-0, on set scores of 11-25, 20-25 and 22-25. Josie Huber was credited with six kills, Hughes-Berheim with four aces, Megan Olson with 14 digs, Josie Huber with 11 digs and Larson with 10.

University of South Dakota junior forward Jenny Teslow (Sioux Falls) was named to the 2012 All-Summit League second team. Teslow started all 18 games for the Coyotes, scoring five goals (including one game-winning goal) and adding one assist. All-conference teams are voted on by league coaches and sports information directors.

# Youngstown State defeats USD 13-10

Youngstown State's defense held off a late University of South Dakota charge to preserve a 13-10 win Saturday at Stambaugh Stadium. The Penguins (5-4, 2-4 MVFC) won for the first time in five tries while the Coyotes (1-8, 0-6) lost their seventh in a row.

The Penguins scored touchdowns on the first possession of both halves. Nate Adams caught a 3-yard touchdown from Kurt Hess for the game's first points (the extra point was missed). Jamaine Cook capped a 9-play, 75-yard drive with a 1-yard plunge early in the third quarter that made it 13-0.

Cook carried a career-high 42 times for 203 yards. His best carry was a 28-yard break to the outside just prior to his 1-yard score. Cook's success controlling the clock left the Coyotes with three offensive possessions in the second half.

South Dakota cashed its first possession of the second half with a 34-yard field goal by Kevin Robb that made it 13-3. Coyote safety Aaron Swift blocked David Brown's 45-yard field goal attempt on the ensuing possession. Josh Vander Maten's 10-yard run, a 15-yard

Youngstown personal foul and a career-best, 22-yard touchdown scamper by Jasper Sanders cut the lead to 13-10 with 10:13 remaining.

The Coyotes' forced a Penguin punt and South Dakota's final possession began from its own 20 with 6:09 left. South Dakota converted two first downs to reach its 45, but was sacked on 4th-and-11 with 1:16 remaining that effectively ended the game.

Youngstown State had allowed averages of 40 points and 374 yards in conference play before holding South Dakota to 10 points and 206 yards. The Coyotes had no points and 88 yards of total offense on six first-half possessions.

Sanders finished with 47 yards rushing on eight carries. Vander Maten led South Dakota with 68 yards rushing, but was 9-of-17 for 85 yards passing against the Missouri Valley's worst pass defense.

South Dakota linebacker Tyler Starr was credited with a career-high 18 tackles, equaling the tally of former Coyote Adam Broders a season ago against Cal Poly. Swift added nine tackles.

# Swimming and diving men, women lose at home

The University of South Dakota men's and women's swimming and diving suffered setbacks at the hands of Green Bay at the USD Pool in the DakotaDome. The men lost 149-89 and the women lost 148-95.

The Coyote women won four of 13 events. Mariah Anderson (Kearney, NE), Shannon Mocer (South Lyon, MI), Hannah Veselik (Darien, IL) and Kaitlyn Jefferson (Westland, MI) opened the meet with a victory in the 4x100-meter medley relay, finishing in 4 minutes and 32.43 seconds.

Megan Chmielewski (Shakopee, MN), Mocer and Jefferson brought home individual event victories for South Dakota. Chmielewski score 262.49 on the 1-meter board. The mark is 19 points shy of the NCAA qualifying mark. Mocer won the 100 breaststroke in 1:14.17 and Jefferson the 50 freestyle in 27.87.

"Megan dove phenomenally today," said head coach Jason Mahowald. "Her score on the 1-meter board was her best by 30 points. She's only 19 points short of qualifying for the

NCAA meet and we are only four meets into the year."

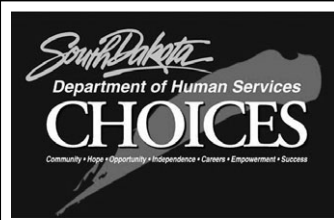
Colin Krysl (Bellevue, NE) came up with the lone win for the USD men, winning the 100 butterfly in a lifetime-best 58.74. Krysl added a second-place finish in the 200 individual medley as well. Blake Frederick (Lincoln, NE) took second in the 400 and 800 freestyle.

"This is a young group," said Mahowald. "We are working hard to improve the little things

with our team and we are making big strides.

"Our goal is to improve every time we get a chance to compete in the pool. This upcoming week we will have a couple more opportunities to do that in Wisconsin."
