The Board of County Commissioners met in regular session Tuesday, November 3, 2015 at 9:00 a.m. Members present: Travis Mockler, Phyllis Packard, Leo Powell, Micheal Manning, and Raymond Passick.

Packard moved, seconded by Powell and carried to approve the agenda.

Minutes of the October 27, 2015 meeting were approved with a motion by Passick, seconded by Manning and carried.

Rod Polley, Highway Superintendent, met with the Board to discuss Highway matters. Powell moved, seconded by Packard and carried to accept low bid of \$2.03/gal. for 1000 +/- gal. of Diesel fuel from Brunick's Service.

Passick moved, seconded by Manning and carried to accept low bid of \$2.04/gal. for 1800 gal. of 10% Ethanol blend fuel from Brunick's Service.

Manning moved, seconded by Packard and carried to accept low bid of \$.799/gal. for 500 gal. of propane at the Wakonda Highway Shop and 2000 gal. of propane at the Vermillion Highway Shop from Long's Propane.

James Morrison, Bethel Township Board, met with the Board to propose removal of a concrete box culvert and replacement with two corrugated culverts on 304 St. 1/2 mile east of 456 Ave. The suggestion was to either downsize to two 36" culverts or upsize to two 48" culverts. Polley discussed that there may be a bump in the road if 48" culverts were to be used. Powell moved,

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seconded by Packard and carried to authorize the highway department to replace the concrete culvert with two 36" inch culverts by any necessary means this year, and Bethel Township will assume responsibility of the culverts after the replacement.

Polley reported on Haul Road Agreement #2015-1 with Pollman Excavation for hauling rock to the Clay County Park boat dock area. It was the consensus of the Board to allow the Auditor to attest the agreement, and it will be on the agenda for formal approval at the next meeting.

The Board discussed the Saginaw Ave. construction. Mike Isaacson and Larry Hawley voiced concerns that the local farmers will be affected by the proposed load limits. The Board discussed the need to protect the road construction that has been completed in order to preserve taxpayer dollars. Polley said this is not a normal gravel road. It is base course gravel that is put under asphalt. The option of lowering the speed limit to 30 mph instead of a weight limit was discussed. Hawley said it would be a fair option. Passick moved, seconded by Manning to adjust the resolution to a 30 mph speed limit, forego the weight limit resolution, and to pass and adopt the following Resolution #2015-16, A Resolution Setting Speed Limit on a Portion of Saginaw Avenue. All voting aye; motion carried.

## USD Seeded Fourth For Summit League Tournament

ELMHURST, Ill.—South Dakota earns the fourth seed into the Summit League Tournament, as announced by the Summit League on Sunday. The Coyotes will be joined by North Dakota State, Oral Roberts, and South Dakota State.

The 2015 Summit League Women's Soccer Championship will be played Thursday and Saturday, Nov. 5 and 7 at Fishback Soccer Park in Brookings, S.D. All games will be streamed free of charge, with the semifinals airing on GoJacks.com and the championship on The-SummitLeague.org.

South Dakota (8-11-0, 5-3-0) play in the second match of the tournament against No. 1 North Dakota State (12-5-1, 7-0-1 Summit League) at 6 p.m. Thursday. No. 2 Oral Roberts (10-7-2, 6-2 Summit League) and No. 3 South Dakota State (10-5-3, 5-1-2 Summit League) will face off in the first match Thursday at 3 p.m.

The winners of Thursday's matches will play in Saturday's championship match at noon with the victor earning an automatic bid to the NCAA College Cup.

# Tsakakis Voted To CoSIDA Academic All-District Team

South Dakota senior midfielder Elena Tsakakis has been named to the Capital One Academic All-District 6 women's soccer team as selected by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

A native of Edina, Minnesota, Tsakakis maintains a perfect 4.00 grade-point average as a biology major. She also has a double minor in sustainability and French. Tsakakis plays an integral role in the Coyotes' midfield, working as both a defender and advancing the ball to the strikers. She has totaled 3,880 minutes on the

pitch with 45 starts in 72 matches. Tsakakis has fired the ball to the back of the net seven times and tallied five assists in her career.

This is Tsakakis' first CoSIDA honor, although she was named to the Academic All-Summit League team last fall.

As a first-team all-district selection, Tsakakis advances to the national ballot to be considered for Academic All-America honors next month. Tsakakis is one of three Summit League athletes to be named to the first team.

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time between quarters, half time and called timeouts that Thunte need to fill, in addition to any unexpected stoppages, like injuries.

"We've got a lot of dead air in the game and that's my job, to try to keep it fresh, keep it rolling, keep people entertained so they don't tune out for when the game gets back on," he said.

Thunte has a team of 15 employees, mostly students, who he communicates with through headsets. His team operates cameras, runs the video board, and produces the internet live stream, as well as the DJ and PA announcer.

Games can be so busy, that Thunte doesn't get a chance to watch any of the action despite being down on field level.

"I'm so locked in with making sure everything goes on time. I have my eye on the clock, but I don't really know what's happening on the field," he said.

USD football games aren't the only events held inside the DakotaDome. USD basketball, USD volleyball, Briar Cliff University football, USD soccer — that's played outside the Dome — and other outside events are all coordinated by the staff at USD athletic department.

"We do it for all the basketball games, track meets,
