## USD Men Add 3

South Dakota men's basketball head coach Craig Smith is pleased to announce the signing of Brandon Armstrong, Tyler Peterson, and Triston Simpson to National Letters of Intent.

"We are thrilled to announce the signing of Tyler, Triston, and Brandon to the Coyote family," said Smith. "These three exemplify great character, determination, and selflessness on and off the court. They will complement one another well as they are very different players. They will fit our culture at USD and make a positive impact on our university, athletic department, and basketball team."

Hailing from San Antonio, Texas, Armstrong is ranked as a top-40 prospect in the state. The 6-foot-5 guard shot 52 percent from the field and 80 percent from the line for Converse Judson High School as a junior. He was named first-team all-district 6A UIL for his efforts. Armstrong has transferred to Holy Cross of San Antonio for his senior season. He plans to major in history at USD.

"Brandon is a long wing whose versatility will allow him to play multiple positions for USD," said Smith. "His size will make him a tough match-up on the perimeter as he has the ability to score in a variety of ways. He excels shooting the basketball and getting fouled. His best basketball is definitely ahead of him."

A 6-foot-4 guard from Lino Lakes, Minn., Peterson eclipsed Centennial High School's program record for scoring during his junior season with 1,195 career points. Peterson is a two-time all-

'whoever has the ball last will win' kind of games, USD took a 34-31 lead.

The Salukis marched all the way down to the Coyote 34-yard line and attempted a 51-yard field goal by Austin Johnson. His low, line drive kick was blocked by a leaping Iddings, and the Coyotes kneeled twice for the victory.

"I knew from the other PATs and field goals that I was getting a pretty good push, and that last one, I just got a little more and gave it a little extra," Iddings said.

For a program that had endured its share of near misses and rough losses in the Missouri Valley, making the kind of clutch plays like USD did Saturday was certainly proof that experience matters.

Put another way, paraphrasing Glenn: Sometimes the lows make the highs all the more sweeter.

"I think you can play better in a game like this when we've had your hand held to the fire and you've seen the fire before," Glenn said.

"You have a little more confidence, a little more experience."

That kind of tenure has guided USD's defense, in particular, this season. Having garnered praise for its second-half effort a week ago at Northern Iowa, the Coyote defense recorded four sacks, two interceptions and two fumbles against an explosive SIU offense.

Cornerback Mike Lilly, who had earlier been the victim of a 79-yard touchdown completion against him, intercepted Iannotti at the 8:11 mark of the fourth quarter.

The Coyotes, however, couldn't capitalize and punted the ball back to the Salukis. It was that takeaway that led to the final touchdown drive for the home team.

"We had a feeling we'd get the ball back, and we took advantage of it," said

can ask for."

For Hora, having the opportunity to even be on the court to experience the highs and lows with her teammates again is a joy, she said. She missed most of last season with an injury, but is back healthy this season as SDSU's kills leader (243).

"It's exciting, because after that injury, I was just happy to be on the court," Hora said. "Progress is always the key, and our thing has been 'push forward.'"

The Coyotes, themselves, have also been pushing forward since the Summit League schedule began.

Sunday's win keeps USD (7-7) in sixth place, which is at least where it wants to stay: The top six teams qualify for the postseason tournament.

To ensure the Coyotes keep pace, they've had to find other offensive weapons following the season-ending injury to Syndey Dimke. The offensive performance Sunday was proof that USD has figured some things out.

Hayley Dotseth led the way with 13 kills, while Biltoft (who hit .611) and Audrey Reeg both had 11 kills. Haley Jorgensen chipped in with eight, setter Brittany Jessen had seven and Lindsey Brown had six.

"That's something we talked to Brittany about, that more people get involved, so it's not the same two

Saeger, who passed for 269 yards and three touchdowns.

Geared up as a potential big game for Iannotti, it was Saeger who instead performed better at the quarterback position. Iannotti passed for 251 yards with two touchdowns, but the Salukis were held to one touchdown after halftime — they tacked on a 50-yard field goal.

Just like a week ago in Cedar Falls, the Coyote defense kept giving the offense chances to take charge.

"We always said, if we made it to the fourth quarter and we were in the game, we were going to win the game," senior linebacker Keyen Lage said. "And we did."

Mindful that they likely needed to win out to reach the playoffs, the Coyotes now set themselves up for next Satur-

day's showdown with rival South Dakota State (7-2, 4-2) — which likely secured its playoff spot with a win Saturday over second-ranked Illinois State.

Next weekend's matchup will mark the first time since the rivalry was renewed in the Missouri Valley that the Coyotes and Jackrabbits meet with playoffs on the line.

"It'll be a lot riding on it, I think," Glenn said. "They're still alive, we're still alive."

Which is why winning Saturday's game with Southern Illinois was all the more important for USD: It couldn't afford to over-look the Salukis.

"In this league you can't look forward, you have to play one game at a time," senior center Thomas McGuire said, "and that's what we're going to do."

people," Williamson said. "That's really when we play our best, when we have three or four hitters contributing."

The Coyotes will close the regular season with a road trip to Indiana, where they will face IUPUI on Friday and Fort Wayne on Saturday. The Summit League tournament will be held Nov. 20-22 in Denver, Colorado.

Meanwhile, Hora and the Jackrab-

bits will continue searching for signs of progression under first-year head coach Nicole Cirillo. After going 0-16 in Summit League action last season, SDSU is 3-11 this season.

"With this group of girls we have, I love every second of it," Hora said. "Win or lose, my teammates are always there."

## Meyer, Strang Named To Summit League All-Tournament Team

BROOKINGS, S.D.—South Dakota senior defender Kasha Meyer and junior striker Corey Strang were named to the 2015 Summit League All-Tournament team.

A senior defender hailing from Lincoln, Neb., Meyer anchored a young Coyote back line during the match. She played all 101 minutes of the match, putting numerous stops on the North Dakota State run game. Meyer also continued to use her height to her advantage, winning headers off North Dakota State's crosses to clear the ball away from South Dakota defensive territory. Meyer came up for a South Dakota corner kick in the 83rd minute, sending a header shot just wide of the post. Two weeks ago in league matches against IUPUI and Western Illinois, Meyer put the game-winners into the back of

the net off a pair of corner kicks.

A junior striker hailing from Temecula, Calif., Strang posted two goals and an assist in the semifinal match of the Summit League Tournament. In addition to setting up the equalizer with an assist, Strang made good on a penalty kick and scored a left-footer on a long bouncing ball from outside the box. With the five points from the match, Strang improved to third in league standings in goals (11) and points (27). Strang also tied for first in the league for penalty kicks made with three.

South Dakota (8-12-0, 5-3-0 Summit League) fell to top-ranked North Dakota State (13-6-1, 7-0-1 Summit League) 4-3 in double overtime of the Summit League semifinal match.
