Dakota Hospital Farewell And Tree of Lights Open House Set For Tuesday

Dakota Hospital Foundation and Sanford Vermillion are hosting a Farewell Ceremony for the historic Dakota Hospital building and celebrating the future of health care in our community with our annual Tree of Lights event at Sanford Vermillion on Tuesday, December 1st from 5 - 7 p.m. All are encouraged to come celebrate and remember, join in the fellowship and enjoy hors d'ouevres and refreshments.

The Tree of Lights program provides community mem-bers with the opportunity to purchase a light in memory of, in honor of or as special holiday greetings to friends, co-workers or loved ones. The 9-1/2 foot Christmas tree located in the Main Lobby at Sanford Vermillion has been designated for the touching display.

With the excitement of the \$14.2 million dollar facility upgrade in progress at Sanford Vermillion, comes too, the time to bid farewell to the historic 3-story original Dakota Hospital building. The project, initiated in May of this year, is approaching the close of phase one which includes new construction on the east side of the medical center campus. New facilities near completion include a drive-through ambulance bay and upgrades in the hospital emergency department as well as new, centrally located, pharmacy and laundry facilities; both previously housed in the original hospital building.

Phase two will involve separation and demolition of the original building and phase three is expected to begin in the summer of 2016. The project will renovate 10,634 square feet of the current space and will add approxi-

mately 17,276 square feet of new construction. A state-of-the-art outpatient facility with centralized registration and expansion at Sanford Clinic Vermillion will round out the remainder of the construction project.

'The Farewell Ceremony, along with plans for a sculpture and video to memorialize personal experiences, sacrifices and community contributions, is a time for all of us to remember fondly the many life events that have taken place over the past 80 years. It was 85 years ago when the health care pioneers of our community perceived a need for a local hospital staffed by professional health care workers and changed the health care landscape in Vermillion. We need to remember those efforts and carry on the tradition of excellence in providing the Vermillion area the finest available care in new and innovative ways," said Tim Tracy, CEO, Sanford Vermillion

The Dakota Hospital Foundation board of directors is, of course, very excited about all the upcoming improvements and upgrades happening on the medical center campus. It's been a project that we knew was crucial for the community to move forward. With the changes, we also want to make a special effort to reflect and recognize the people (and structure) that served so importantly in the care and lives of so many of our community," said

Kevin Myron, president, Dakota Hospital Foundation. "We have been so pleased to have so many people share their memories and stories related to the old Dakota Hospital. I look forward to the additional stories we will hear at the farewell and celebration ceremony! I hope everyone takes this opportunity to come and share their memories with us," concluded Myron.

they can do the single item donations or donate what we call the buddy baskets. It's essentially a laundry basket full of household items and goods that people are in need of that you wouldn't necessarily think of every day but those little numbers add up. They donate in different ways. Some Legions do a combination. They'll do buddy baskets, single item donations and gift cards depending on what works for them. I know we have done a combination for all four years.'

The variety of ways to donate is especially helpful in Simunek and Ben's opinions because people can donate in whichever manner is easiest for them.

"A lot of people who it's harder for them to move around, some of the elderly people, they usuall donate a check by mailing that in because it's quicker for them," Simunek said. "They know they're doing something to give back but they don't have to get up and do a lot in order to contribute. Something that great about this particular drive is there's a lot of way to give back to our Veteran and none of them are any less credible than another.

"Last year we had a community member who were downsizing their house and called me," Ben remembered. "They said they had a lot of items that were given to them over th years that were either new or gently used and quite usable. I enlisted a friend of mine who had a truck. They had it all in an area ir their house. We picked it u and took it to the Broadcaster's."

A desirable aspect of th drive is the funds and good stay local.

"Anything that is not kept at the legion for longterm use or the VSO office such as these gift cards will go to the Berakhah house,' Simunek said. "It's the Siou Falls drop-off location. That is a great facility because
