Yearly flu vaccinations are recommended for everyone, but some groups are at higher risk for complications, including young infants. Pregnant women, people older than 50 and those with chronic medical conditions are also at higher risk.

Direct government regulation (like CAFE standards for motor vehicles) reduces emissions at a cost several times higher than that of a carbon tax.

The talk will concentrate on the analysis that provides the reasons for preferring the tax on carbon to all alternatives.

Lifeline is a government benefit program and consumers who willfully make false statements in order to obtain the benefit can be punished by fine or imprisonment or can be barred from the program. Also, as long as a qualified individual agrees to toll blocking, that individual is not required to pay a deposit prior to our service being offered. Toll blocking is offered to qualifying individuals without charge.
