Bulldogs Pounce Tanagers At Homecoming

The Vermillion High School homecoming football game was not much for celebration as the No.1 ranked Madison Bulldogs routed the Tanagers 48-16.

Madison found the end zone six times in the first half, starting with a fumble by the Tanagers on the second play of the game that was recovered by the Bulldogs, and four plays later ended with a 21-yard touchdown run. Madison would recover another fumble with just over two minutes in the first quarter for a seven-yard touchdown run making the score 27-0

"Those fumbles really hurt us and (with) Madison, you can't just let a team that close to the end zone that has that kind of offensive power," said head coach Andy Homan. "They are able to move the ball quite well."

Vermillion had possession of the ball to begin the second quarter, but Madison would take over on downs after Tana-

ger quarterback Carter Kratz was sacked. Trey Hage recovered a Madison fumble to regain possession. Rylan Pratt then carried the ball 11 yards for a first down, but Madison would force Vermillion to punt to end the drive.

The returning 45-yard drive resulted in a touchdown for the Bulldogs on three plays. Madison posted another seven points a few minutes later for a 41-0 halftime lead.

"We had them wrapped up at times," Homan said. "We made some good plays, but that quarterback-running back combo they have in the backfield is pretty hard to stop."

Vermillion held Madison to just one touchdown in the second half and found the end zone two times to outscore the Bulldogs 16-7 in the second two quarters.

Madison's final score came two minutes into the third quarter on a 24-yard run, but Vermillion answered on the next drive that resulted in seven plays, four first downs and



Wagner held the lead for most of set three, but the Tanagers managed to tie the game at 19 thanks to Emily Bye coming up big on defense with multiple digs to keep some points away from Wagner. Bye recorded 18 total digs in the match.

"Our defensive people have been on their feet going after balls and digging," Jarchow said.

The Red Raiders regained the lead 20-19 and held on for 25-20 win.

W. Illinois Tops USD In Home Opener

VERMILLION - While the stats may have shown the University of South Dakota volleyball team probably should have won, it didn't.

And through the early stages of the season, that's been a familiar sight for the Coyotes, according to head coach Leanne Williamson.

Her squad, which spent the non-conference portion of the schedule trying to find new leaders, came up just short in Friday night's Summit League opener against Western Illinois at the DakotaDome. The Leathernecks won the first two sets, the Coyotes won the next two, but critical mistakes by USD down the stretch allowed Western Illinois to win 3-2 (32-30, 29-27, 10-25, 13-15, 15-11).

That's a little bit of who we've been; a roller coaster," Williamson said. "And some of that is meshing and figuring who can do what on the court."

Juniors Sydney Dimke and Audrey Reeg have taken on increased roles in the offense for the Coyotes (6-8), while senior Kelsey Biltoft and junior Lindsey Brown have handled the duties in the middle, and sophomore Brittany Jessen returns at setter.


