The Board of County Commissioners met in regular session Tuesday, October 13, 2015 at 9:00 a.m. Members present: Travis Mockler, Phyllis Packard, Leo Powell, Micheal Manning; Raymond Passick was absent.  
 Packard moved, seconded by Powell and carried to approve the agenda.  
 Minutes of the October 6, 2015 meeting were approved with a motion by Manning, seconded by Passick and carried.  
 Rod Polley, Highway Superintendent, met with the Board to discuss highway matters. Larry Erickson, Riverside Township Board, was also present to discuss the bridge at 303 St. & 461 Ave. Powell moved, seconded by Manning and carried to authorize Polley to proceed with replacing the bridge with two 36 inch metal culverts; the Township will widen the intersection radius, and the site will be the responsibility of the Township going forward after the bridge replacement.  
 Polley reported that the bridge over the creek on 457 Ave. north of Meckling is now posted at 28 tons due to requirements from the state and engineering findings.

### BUSINESS REMINDER: Deadline To Report Unclaimed Property Is Nov. 2

PIERRE – State Treasurer Rich Sattgast reminds all businesses to review their records and report any funds, securities or other property that have gone unclaimed to the Office of the State Treasurer by Monday, Nov. 2.

South Dakota State Law (SDCL 43-41B) requires that businesses, otherwise known as holders, report property which is presumed to be "abandoned" or "unclaimed" to the state treasurer after the appropriate dormancy period.

"Banking and financial organizations, business associations, utility companies and legal entities are all required by law to report unclaimed property to the state," said Sattgast. "It's important that businesses are informed of their unclaimed property reporting and escheatment obligations."

Unclaimed property is lost financial assets such as uncashed payroll checks, inactive savings accounts, utility deposits, uncashed stock and mutual fund dividends, stock certificates, overpayments, credit balances, refunds, gift certificates and uncashed insurance payments.

"Businesses are required to report unclaimed property down to the penny. Both the Treasurer's office and the businesses reporting unclaimed property want to ensure every cent is returned to the rightful owners," Sattgast said. "It really is a positive program for everyone involved."

## USD History Professor To Present Annual Harrington Lecture On Greece

University of South Dakota history professor Clayton Lehmann will present "Imagining Greece" at the 63rd Annual Harrington Lecture at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, Oct. 28, in Old Main's Farber Hall.

Lehmann, Ph.D., will address how people perceive Greece, from the poet Homer in ancient history to the media coverage of recent elections. His talk will also compare outsiders' perspectives of Greece with how Greeks think about themselves.

Since joining USD in 1988, Lehmann has taught classes in Greek and Roman history, Western civilization, archaeology, epigraphy, language and literature. A South Dakota native, Lehmann earned his bachelor's degree from Augustana College, his master's degree from the University of Maryland and a doctorate in ancient history from the University of Chicago. While working on his dissertation, he traveled to Greece and developed a life-long love of the country. Lehmann regularly returns to Greece to travel and study, three times as the Gertrude Smith Professor at the American School of Classical Studies to direct an intensive summer study tour of Greece for advanced students and teachers of the classics. He also runs a study-abroad program that takes students from USD and other institutions to Greece, where the group travels to historic and cultural locations on a sailing yacht. Since this program's inception 2005, 115 students have traveled and studied in various parts of the country with Lehmann and his fellow faculty members. Much of Lehmann's research focuses on Greek history with his most recent work concerning the Greek historian Thucydides.

Named in 1966 in honor of Elbert Harrington, professor of speech and dean of USD's College of Arts & Sciences (1945-1970), the lecture is an annual event featuring a distinguished professor with long-standing service to the College of Arts & Sciences. Each year a faculty committee from the department recommends to the dean the name of a faculty member to deliver the Harrington Lecture. The faculty member must be a teacher and scholar, and the lecture must be non-technical, blending insight into liberal education with the faculty member's work as a scholar. A reception will be held immediately following the lecture.

## S.D. Council Of Teachers Meet

The 2015 annual South Dakota Council of Teachers of English (SDCTE) conference was held on September 11-12, in Sioux Falls. The theme for the conference was "Story as the Landscape of Knowing." 58 teachers from area middle schools, high schools, and post-secondary institutions took part in the conference, including Carla McMurry-Kozak from Vermillion High School, who was elected Vice-President of SDCTE for 2015-2017.

Teachers were able to attend workshops throughout the day on Friday and Saturday, covering a number of topics ranging from pedagogy to book talks to managing the teaching lifestyle. The awards banquet was held on Friday evening. John Miller, former professor of History at SDSU, the organizations' 2015 author of the year, was the guest speaker. Patrick Hicks, professor and writer-in-residence at Augustana College, was also announced as the organizations' 2016 author of the year.

Also honored at this year's banquet was the SDCTE teacher of the year, Kirsten Rohla, who teaches High School English courses in the Bell Fourche school district. Alyssa Laufmann of Brookings High School was presented with the young leader award.

SDCTE will hold their 2016 conference September 9-10 in Watertown, SD.

## Lt. Governor Visits Electric Boat Facility To Discuss Plans For USS SD

PIERRE – Lt. Gov. Matt Michels visited the Connecticut facility where the USS South Dakota SSN 790 will be built. At the facility, Michels toured the recently commissioned USS Illinois and met with the ship commander, the chief of the boat and the ship manager who is overseeing construction of the USS South Dakota.

"The USS South Dakota BB-57 was the most decorated warship of World War II. With the construction of the SSN 790, we're moving the history of the USS South Dakota forward to protect our nation," said Lt. Gov. Michels.

General Dynamics Electric Boat is building the multi-mission nuclear powered Virginia class submarine which will support a crew of 130 sailors. The company has been building submarines since 1899 when it assembled the U.S. Navy's first commissioned undersea warship, the USS Holland.

Construction for the USS South Dakota will begin in 2016. The submarine is expected to be complete in August of 2018.

dogs," Betzen said. "It's a morning event targeted towards young kids and whoever else wants to come. We're having a distracted driver simulator where they can sit and drive like you were texting or something. We're going to have a rollover simulator, state troopers, state troopers are bringing in a dog, 911 is going to have a simulator where you can practice dialing 911 and ask questions and have a variety of different outreach programs that we have that we'll have tables on and we can explain. Plus the kids can trick or treat at each table and get tours of the cars. There will be people in costumes and it's just a good time for a few hours. That's it in a nutshell."

Such a good time calls for rallying the troops, quite literally.

"We have troopers coming in and deputies helping," Betzen said. "It's kind of an all-hands effort from the local law enforcement. It's rarely just the Vermillion police department. We had the place and a few extra people so we were able to do the advertisement and planning. It really is a group effort."

With so many helpers, scheduling does become an issue.

"You have a group of people that work 24-7," Betzen said. "They all work different schedules so making sure you get enough

people and being able to schedule them is hard. So that's probably the biggest challenge is putting on an event in the middle of the day which requires a lot of people."

No matter who you are, Betzen said everyone will be able to find some useful information on safety as well as fun.

According to Betzen, highest safety concerns depend on personal circumstances.

"It's probably dependent on the individual and what their interests are, what their age group is," he said. "If you're talking about small kids it could be stranger danger or staying away from guns. If you're talking about kids in elementary school you could talk about bike safety and the importance of bicycle issues as far as being careful when you cross the street, things like that. It really just depends on the age group and what their issues are. We have such a large assortment of programs because we keep trying to tailor it to what issues we see and then trying to address those usually with education of some sort. It just kind of depends on which group and what they're looking for."

Betzen has noticed some common safety issues in Vermillion.

"The biggest single issue we deal with which still only constitutes about 20 percent of our work, is underage drinking and the resulting vandalism, injuries, alcohol poisoning that

occurs with that," he said. "Other than that it's pretty much what you see in any other small town America. Trying to keep people safe, traffic issues. We've got high speeds coming into town and we try to slow people down so when accidents occur, because accidents will happen with cars, they occur at lower speeds because lower speeds lead to less injuries and less damage. We deal with everything from drugs and the occasional major assaults to sexual assaults to DULs to people complaining about skateboarding on sidewalks. It's all over the gamut."

An aspect of the job Betzen enjoys.

"People talk about how they want a job that's different every day," he said. "Well, it's different every day. Truly one day you could be talking about how you're going to investigate a homicide and the next day you could be discussing what you're going to do about a handicap zone in the street in some part of town that you have never looked at."

Betzen hopes that people come and see what the Vermillion Police Department has to offer at the Public Safety open house.

"Don't need to bring any money, just bring your kids and a trick or treat bag," he said. "We just want you to come and have fun, see what we do, bring your questions, bring your kids and have a good time for a couple of hours."
