The Department of Human Services joins a broad effort to observe National Disability Employment Awareness Month, an annual awareness campaign that takes place each October. The purpose of National Disability Employment Awareness Month is to educate about disability employment issues and celebrate the many and varied contributions of America's workers with disabilities.

The history of National Disability **Employment Awareness Month** traces back to 1945, when Congress enacted a law declaring the first week in October each year "National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week." In 1962, the word "physically" was removed to acknowledge the employment needs and contributions of individuals with all types of disabilities. In 1988, Congress expanded the week to a month and changed the name to National Disability Employment Awareness Month.

Civil War discussion series coming to Cultural Heritage Center

"Making Sense of the American Čivil War," a series of three scholar-led discussions, will be held at the Cultural Heritage Center in Pierre on Oct. 11 and 20, and Nov. 4.

At each session, the conversation will focus on a different facet of the Civil War experience, using one or more common texts as the foundation for the discussion. Discussion leaders will be Brad Tennant, associate professor of history at Presentation College in Aberdeen, and Donovin Sprague, a professor at Black Hills State University in Spearfish.

"Back east it was the Civil War – out here on the Northern Plains it was a whole different situation," Tennant said. "I think it's often overlooked."

Books to be discussed are "March" by Geraldine Brooks, "Crossroads of Freedom: Antietam" by James McPherson, and "America's War: Talking About the Civil War and Emancipation on Their 150th Anniversaries," edited by Edward L. Ayers. Also included will be a booklet of readings compiled by Tennant and Sprague focusing on events that occurred in Dakota Territory and the surrounding region

during the Civil War period. Readers may sign out and borrow the books from the Cultural Heritage Center. The books are available in the Administration Office from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. CST on weekdays, and at the front desk on weekends.

•Thursday, Oct. 11, 7 p.m. -the discussion will center on the booklet of readings focusing on the Civil War period on the Northern Plains, Both Tennant and Sprague will serve as discussion leaders.

·Saturday, Oct. 20, 10:30 a.m. -- the second discussion will be on Ayers' "America's War," especially sections 2 and 5, with Tennant as discussion leader.

•Sunday, Nov. 4, 2 p.m. --Tennant will lead the discussion of "March" and "Crossroads of Freedom: Antietam."

English mansion near Akron opens for Oct. 6 tour

The English mansion on Highway 48, just west of Akron, IA, in South Dakota, stands out with its red tile roof and concrete walls. The century-old manor, which is listed on the National Register of Historic Places, is a curiosity to travelers and many area residents.

Its owners, Roger and Angela Price, will open their home next month for a tour that will benefit the Akron Area Museum, which needs a new roof. The tour will be held Saturday, Oct. 6, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

The mansion is located at 48113 South Dakota Highway 48, across the Big Sioux River from Akron. Because the mansion is a private residence, the tour will be strictly limited to the scheduled time. Tickets are \$10 each if

purchased in advance and \$15 at the door. To order tickets, send payment and a self-

addressed, stamped envelope to: Akron Area Museum, P.O. Box 252, Akron, Iowa 51001. Tickets will not be mailed out unless a SASE is included with payment. All ticket requests by mail must be received by Sept. 30 to insure the purchaser receives them in time. Tickets also can be purchased at the Akron Veterinary Clinic and at Peoples Bank in Akron.

People with questions about the tour should call Angela Price at 605-565-2717. The mansion was originally

the home of F.P. Baker, one of several English settlers who came to the Akron and Le Mars area during the 1880's. Although many of the settlers returned to England in the 1890's, Baker remained on the farm he purchased near Akron.

In 1912, he contracted with G.W. Burkhead, a Sioux City architect, to design the house as a replica of his home in

England. Many of the items used in construction were imported from England. The house was completed in 1914.

Features include a glassenclosed porch that wraps around three sides. Three of the six upstairs bedrooms open onto a second-story, open porch.

The "great hall," or living room, measures 36x22 feet. It has heavy wooden crossbeams on the ceilings, an elegant fireplace and open staircase. Wood paneling or built-in furniture is in many of the

The third floor of the house, a billiard and ballroom, measures 60 by 23 feet.

All proceeds from the tour will be used toward a new roof for the Akron Area Museum, which is located at 601 Main Street in Akron.

Indian Education Summit to feature national experts

PIERRE, S.D. – The 2012 Indian Education Summit will be held Sept. 23-25 at Cedar Shore

The annual event will feature Drs. Raphael Guillory, Anton Treuer and Laurel Vermillion as keynote speakers. Many successful programs from South Dakota will also be featured in keeping with the theme of "Community, Culture, Collaboration."

Guillory is a tenured professor in the Department of Psychology at Eastern Washington University. He is well-published on his scholarly research of American Indian/Alaska Native student persistence in U.S. educational systems.

Treuer is professor of Ojibwe at Bemidji State University in Minnesota. He is editor of the Oshkaabewis Native Journal and author of nine

books.

Vermillion is a recognized member of the Hunkpapa-Lakota peoples of the Standing Rock Reservation and is president of Sitting Bull College. Prior to her work in the postsecondary academic environment, she taught elementary school in a Bureau of Indian Affairs school for 14 years.

The goal of the Indian Education Summit is to provide solutions to the unique challenges American Indian students face, and to present successful models for educators to implement. The conference is an opportunity for collaboration among state leaders, tribal and Bureau of Indian Education schools, and individual school districts.
