

Vermillion Youth Learn To HuntSAFE

Thanks to volunteers dedicated to the safety of young hunters, the South Dakota Department of Game Fish and Parks held a HuntSAFE course last week with both classroom and hands-on experience.

"The goal of the HuntSAFE courses is to teach young hunters safe handling of firearms, in the home as well as in the field," the department's website reads. "We also want to develop safe, responsible hunters who are aware of our hunting heritage and who understand the hunter's role and relationship with wildlife and the land, as well as certify persons under the age of 16 to make them eligible to apply for hunting licenses."

According to Tony Stokely, Wildlife Conservation Officer, participants need to complete a minimum of 10 hours with the class, a written test and the hands-on portion.

"They have to at minimum turn 12 years old by December 31 of this year," he said. "Once they do that and take the class they are eligible for their own hunting licenses."

Kayleen, 11, was one of the younger participants.

"I really like to hunt," she said. "My dad does it and I think it's fun. Sometimes I like just sitting up in the trees because I like getting up in the mornings and I like just watching. You have to be patient. You can't be talking and moving a lot. It's just kind of cool sometimes."

Though Kayleen learned most of what was covered in the course from her dad, she appreciated the knowledge shared in the course.

"My favorite part was probably when we get to watch the movies about all the hunting accidents," she said. "We also learned how to handle a gun safely and point it in a safe direc-

tion and all of the parts of the gun and stuff."

According to Stokely it was not only hunters that attended the course.

"Hunting is not the main focus on this," he said. "It's a safety thing. We've got girls in the class that not only hunt but they babysit. So if they're babysitting little Joe and the kid comes out with a gun from his dad's closet, we want them to know how to safely take away that weapon. We incorporate a little first aid and stuff like that or if they get lost in the woods, things like that what they should and should not do."

It wasn't only kids either. "We've also got parents go through the course," Stokely said. "It's open to anybody who wants to take it as long as they're 12 years old. Mostly kids but we had six adults this year or something like that. If they're under 16 they have to pass this course to participate with hunting licenses. We've got kids

from 12 years old. In other states to purchase a non-resident hunting license you need a Huntsafe card. So they go to Wyoming or Colorado to go elk hunting, that's why they go through the class.

For those who could not attend the course, Stokely gave some pointers.

"The number one rule is to keep the muzzle of the firearm in a safe direction," he said. "Keep their finger out of the trigger. Also the safety on the weapon if you push that over, when it's orange it can fire. What we try to get across to people is it's mechanical so it can break so don't rely on that. Just keep your finger out of the trigger."

The course also included going over carrying and firing positions, showing participants the most safe and accurate positions.

So we just decided to do a \$5 entry per salsa and first prize will be cash so usually we try to keep 50 percent back for the charity and the other 50 percent

"Generally every year we give to the Vermillion Food Pantry, we give to Coats for Kids, the backpack program and Heartland Humane," Brewer said. "So those are the main ones that we do every year. We've also done the Diabetes Research and the Vermillion Public Library. We try to give anywhere from three to six hundred dollars to each one. It depends on how much we bring in."

The salsa event was relaxed and casual, as winners were not required to be present and tasters came and went as desired.

"They just dropped the salsa off because we didn't require them to be present," Brewer said. "We were just talking about what we can do next year to make it a little bit bigger."

In the meantime, focus turns to the other events the Eagles club is hosting in the near future.

"We do have our summer raffle that's going on and our poker run which is pretty big," Brewer said.

"That's the one that brings in most of our money."

According to Brewer, the summer raffle this year includes a 55 inch TV, a camera and a Blu-ray player among other things.

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endoscopy at the VA. But it is a nice fit with my role at the medical school, because it is so busy trying to fit everything we do."

Ridgway noted that because he oversees the USD Medical School faculty, it allows him as not only a member of the organization but also as a member of the medical school to reach out to faculty and find out from

the doctors in rural areas what is working and what it not. It allows the SDSMA to brainstorm other ways to get students to come back to South Dakota.

Because the American Medical Association called on medical schools to increase their class sizes by 30 percent, Gov. Dennis Daugaard approved increased funding for the medical school and it just accepted the first expanded class of students.

"So, now we have all these increased class sizes

and new medical schools that have crept up across the country, the problem is that after your four years of medical school, you then have to go into a residency," he said. "Residencies have not increased their slots since 1997. So, if you are going to have a residency program Medicare dollars pay for it. So, now if you are going to offer a new medical residency - Sanford Health has done this with a surgical residency program - it is paid solely by health

system."

He said these issues and more are what he will be talking to at the district meetings.

"These district meetings are about transparency, it's about reaching out to our members and asking what can we do better," Ridgway said. "I have learned this association is not about 'me' or 'I'; it is about our patients, it is about South Dakota, about the public health of South Dakota."
