Yotes Freshmen Making An Impact

When Joe Glenn took over the University of South Dakota football program in 2011, he inherited a roster that had 12 players from the state of Florida.

By the 2014 season, that number was down to four.

And following a 2-win season (none coming in the Missouri Valley Football Conference) in 2015, there was a sense that the Coyotes could use some speed – as Glenn puts it, guys that have 'another gear."

So far, it appears that USD has exactly that among the six recruits it brought it in from the Sunshine State.

"They're all fast guys," Glenn said after Monday's practice in Vermillion, as he jotted down notes on a roster about three freshmen in particular.

Of the freshmen on the roster, two from Florida have emerged as candidates to play this season: Michael Fredrick (RB, Miami) and Shamar Jackson (RB/WR, Pahokee).

"Not that I'd call it a surprise, because we knew they were good recruits, but we hadn't



recruited in Florida for quite a while," Glenn said.

The Coyotes realized, though, that in order to take a step forward, the regional recruiting base might need to be expanded for some quickness especially considering USD's longest play from scrimmage last vear was 43 yards.

And so, six new Florida players are in Vermillion, giving USD a total of eight on the roster from that state. The other incoming freshmen include Jovane Parkinson (DB), Luis Peguero (DL), Eric Saintil (WR) and Samy JeanClaude (DL).

"They recruited a lot of speed," the 5-foot-8, 160-pound Jackson said, smiling. "That's what they wanted the most, so that's what we wanted to bring to the table.'

Even if it meant for those players to travel halfway across the nation to a town of 10,000 residents.

"When I first committed, I didn't think anyone from Florida was up here. Now it's

five of us," the 5-foot-10, 165-pound Fredrick said.

"We can relate to each other and we know what we can all do.'

Those five freshmen have been able to learn from the Florida natives already on the Coyote roster: Tyson Graham (DB, Pompano Beach) and Paul Anderson (WR, West Park).

"I feel like we bring a lot of speed and work ethic," Fredrick said. "The guys coming in, we knew the history at South Dakota, so we came in determined and ready to change things.'

Even though the Coyotes are nearing the end of fall camp (the season opener is Sept. 5 at Kansas State), the newcomers are still adjusting to life in Vermillion, Jackson said.

'My first couple days, I was lost," he said. "I had to really study the playbook to get everything down. Now, I'm coming along just fine.

Although nothing was guaranteed to those freshman (it was likely most were going to redshirt), they've worked hard in pre-season practices with the goal of seeing the field on Sept. 5, Fredrick said.

"I come from the city, so moving twentyfour hours away from home is quite different," he said. "I came here for football, so that's my main focus."

Fredrick and Jackson aren't the only two freshmen who could impact the Coyotes this season. Glenn pointed out a third option, Danny Rambo, a wide receiver from Georgia who went to high school in Colorado.

Rambo, a 5-foot-10 and 160 pounds, could help the Coyote offense stretch the field for junior quarterback Ryan Saeger – who takes the

reins this season. The three freshmen have impressed the coaches with their knowledge of the game and their attention to detail, Glenn said.

"They've been really sharp and focused," he said. "They ask questions in meetings that are good questions."

If that means they see the field right away, fine. But Fredrick and Jackson both maintained that their goal is simply help the team.

"It's just an honor,' Jackson said. "Most players don't get the opportunity to play two positions like I do.'

"I felt like we left a little on the table there, but I am happy that we got some goals in and hopefully they start to follow a little more frequently here in the future."

CANTON - The VHS Tanagers knew they were in for a tough battle their season opener last Friday. However, even coming up short on the scoreboard, the team and coaches took away positives from the game.

Vermillion High School opened the 2015 football season against top five ranked Canton.

"Canton, we knew coming in they'd be a good team," said Vermillion head coach Andy Homan. "They have a lot of big kids and there's a reason why they are the top five in the state.

While Tanager scoring was limited – a 62-yard touchdown pass was the only scoring play VHS managed in the 33-6 loss in Canton - in the second half Vermillion's defense buckled down and held Canton to just one touchdown.

With just under seven minutes to play in the first quarter, Canton marched down the field to the Vermillion 14-yard line. Canton threw a touchdown pass that was called back on a C-Ĥawks holding to the Vermillion 22-yard line for first and 22.

The next play, Canton threw for a 21-yard gain to the Vermillion 1-yard line.

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The Vermillion High School girls' soccer team played for three wins in as many games last week to improve to 4-1 on the season.

Last Thursday, the Tanagers faced off against Garretson after suffering the only loss of the season to Tea just two days before.

'We, unfortunately, lost to Tea at the beginning of the week, but we used it as a lesson and we learned from it and I think in the long run that will pay off," said head coach Shannon Fitzsimmons.

That lesson was paid off as Vermillion cruised to a 10-0 win over Garretson at Cotton Park on a raining, thundering night.

We came out strong and we continued to keep our pressure and momentum up and that's what I like to see," Fitzsimmons said.

The game ended 20 minutes early due to weather conditions and the large margin in goals.

"It was a fun game for the girls because it was kind of raining and the girls always like to play in wet conditions because the ball is going everywhere and sliding, so that kind of got them excited and we had a lot of enthusiasm for that game," Fitzsimmons said.

On Saturday, the Groton Tigers scored just two minutes into the game, but it was all Tanagers after that as Vermillion rolled to a 5-1 win in front of a packed house at Cotton Park.

With 19 minutes to play in the first half, Kasey Herbster beat a Groton defender and put the ball over the goalie's header into the back of the net to even the game at one.

Vermillion took the 2-1 lead just before half off an own-goal by Groton from a Tanager corner kick.

"I thought our girls were able to

recover from an early goal, they stayed focused and they didn't let it get to them," Fitzsimmons said.

In the second half, senior Katie Kost scored on a header with 23 minutes left to play off a cross by Makenna Koble to make the score 3-1.

A few minutes later, Natasha Samudzi collected a rebound just outside the 18vard box and dribbled in for a shot and a goal. Samudzi then followed that up with another goal about four minutes later off a one-time shot from about 10 yards out during a scuffle in front of the net.

"We worked on communicating and controlling and that exactly what won the game for us today," Fitzsimmons said.

On Tuesday, the Tanagers traveled to Sioux Falls for a matchup against Sioux Falls Christian. The forward momentum continued and Vermillion walked away with a 3-1 win.
