As a way of thanking them there is a mention of them in our programs. We have a couple of members who kind of pool their resources then collectively donate to First Nighters. That happens

It helps them pay for an education," Genna said. "That way students aren't having to rely on going to work to help pay for school so they can focus more time on their studies.
