Coyotes Ready To Protect The Dome

VERMILLION – It had been one month shy of two years since the University of South Dakota football team won a game away from the DakotaDome.
With that streak snapped after last Saturday's 27-17 victory at UC Davis, the Coyotes now want to keep that momentum rolling into Saturday's home opener with Drake. Kickoff is 2 p.m. in Vermillion.

"It's always fun going out to play a team on the road and coming back with a win," said USD junior Trevor Bouma, who rushed for a career-high 186 yards with two touchdowns at UC Davis. "It makes the trip back so much better."

The Coyotes (1-1), however, won't exactly have an easy game to come back to. Drake (1-1), an FCS program in the non-scholarship Pioneer League, nearly made a full comeback against North Dakota last Saturday. UND built a 21-0 halftime lead, but the Bulldogs rallied to get within 21-18 but a failed onside kick ended Drake's hopes.

Not only did that close result catch the attention of the Coyotes, but so too did the way Drake shut down the North Dakota run game: The Bulldogs held UND to 25 yards on 36 carries – a week after North Dakota ran wild in an FBS win over Wyoming.

"Slowing a team like UND down to twenty-five yards rushing is something to make a point of," Bouma said. "We have to come in and take this

like every other week; focus in and get better every day."

And that's exactly what the Coyotes did between week one and week two.

After a season-opening loss at Kansas State, USD recovered to put together one of its finest all-around performances in head coach Joe Glenn's tenure in Vermillion.

The Coyotes controlled special teams (never letting UC Davis do much in the return game), held the Aggies to 60 rushing yards, recorded four sacks, intercepted three passes and recovered one fumble. And the offense, led by Bouma, did just enough for USD to get the win.

"It was all three phases of the game working together to get a victory," Glenn said this week.

Defensively, in particular, USD showed perhaps its biggest improvement – even from last year. A year ago, the Coyotes recorded only eight sacks and were rarely causing problems in the opposing backfield. A switch to a four-man front this season, however, produced instant results at UC Davis.

"I think so far we've done a good job of stopping the run," junior safety Jacob Warner said. "And if we keep doing that, we're going to be one of the best defenses in the Valley, in my opinion."

The Coyotes now face a Drake team that ran for only 38 yards against North Dakota, but had given up 119 yards on the ground in a season-opening win over a Division II program.

What does USD expect Saturday? Probably a similar Drake effort to the one that nearly resulted in a win in Grand Forks, according to Glenn.

"They're not going to go away on us either," he said. "They're almost all seniors, so we'll have a tough game."

To that point, Drake started eight seniors on offense last week and 10 seniors on defense. That's the kind of experience the Coyotes are hoping to build toward, as Glenn pointed out.

"They have a lot of seniors, a lot of experience," Warner said. "It definitely won't be an easy game, we need to be focused for this one."

"As long as we worry about ourselves and just keep getting better."

Reeg Earns All-Tourney Team Nod At UND Classic

GRAND FORKS, N.D. – South Dakota junior outside hitter Audrey Reeg tallied 55 kills and 28 digs through four matches to earn a spot on the UND Classic all-tournament team. The Coyotes split a pair of matches Saturday, defeating Drake 3-1 and falling to Green Bay 1-3 at Betty Engelstad Sioux Center.

Three Phoenix tallied more than 10 kills apiece in four sets to push Green Bay (7-3) past South Dakota 20-25, 25-19, 25-21, 25-21 in the first game of the Coyotes' double-header on Saturday.

"Our match against Green Bay was disappointing," head coach Leanne Williamson commented. "We were able to finish out game one, but we got comfortable. We didn't push back consistently until the end of the fourth game, but it was too late at that point. I truly believe we were in control and beat ourselves."

South Dakota was led by Reeg's double-double with 16 kills and 10 digs. Junior middle blocker Lindsey Brown also reached double digits with 10 kills. Sophomore setter Brittany Jessen set up 34 assists.

On the receiving end, freshman libero Lauren Mattison led the way with 20 digs. Seniors Kaitlyn Hastings and Sydney Dimke helped out with 17 and 15 digs, respectively.

The Coyotes took set one 25-20 behind five kills from Reeg. South

Dakota jumped out to a 13-5 lead behind two kills apiece from senior Kelsey Biltoft, freshman Hayley Dotseth, and Reeg. Hastings went on a four-point serving run during that time with one ace and forced two Phoenix attacking errors. South Dakota never trailed in the first set and Reeg put the Phoenix away with her fifth kill on the final point.

Jessen's ace on the first point of the second game positioned the Coyotes in a 10-4 lead. Green Bay tied the set up at point 16 and never trailed again as they closed out set two 25-19.

Neither team trailed by more than two at the beginning of the third set until a pair of kills by Green Bay's Beth Kuske and a pair of Coyote attacking errors put the Phoenix up 10-6. Kills from Reeg, Biltoft and Dimke allowed the Coyotes to hang on near the end of the set. Green Bay's Emily Riese spiked down a kill at match point to solidify the third set 25-21 for the Phoenix.

In the Coyotes' first time of reaching a fourth set in 2015, the score remained even through the seventh point. A kill by Kuske and

two South Dakota attack errors put Green Bay up 10-7. A 4-0 run by Green Bay pushed the Phoenix into a 20-12 lead, the largest lead of the set. South Dakota closed with a 9-5 run behind kills from Biltoft, Reeg, Jessen, and Brown, but the Phoenix finished the final set off 25-21.

South Dakota rallied in the second match of the day in taking down Drake (8-4) 25-20, 23-25, 25-17, 25-20. Reeg recorded her second double-double on the day with 19 kills and 12 digs. Dimke swatted down 15 kills in the Coyotes' total 59. Jessen had a match-high 47 assists.

The Coyotes split the defensive effort with Reeg's 12 digs, Jessen tallied 15, Hastings added 14 and Mattison had 14.

"The Drake match wasn't clean, but we were able to serve well and force them into bad situations which helped our defense," said Williamson. "Our energy and determination were a big change from the first match. Sydney did a great job of erasing the first match and being a go-to player for us once again. Audrey led us offensively and gave the team someone to rely on."

South Dakota started the first set with a run of three with kills by Reeg and Biltoft. The Bulldogs tied up the set at 7-7. The two teams rallied back and forth until the 17th

point. The Coyotes pulled ahead with five kills from Reeg in the final seven points as the Coyotes won 25-20.

Drake took the second set 25-23 with two Coyote attack errors on the final two points.

Neither team had more than a two point advantage through the 12th point. Dimke had an ace and a kill as the Coyotes went up 18-13. Reeg swatted down a pair of kills, Hastings and Jessen served aces, and Biltoft tallied a kill as South Dakota finished off the third set 25-17.

With Jessen serving, South Dakota went on a 6-0 run to start the fourth set. Jessen had an ace, Dimke had two kills and Reeg notched one kill during that span. Four Coyote attack errors helped Drake tie up the set at eight. Drake's Grace Schofield and Dotseth each tallied a pair of kills to keep the score tied at 10. The score tied up again at 19, ensuing a timeout called by Williamson. After the pep talk, the Coyotes finished off the final six points with two aces by Hastings, kills from Dotseth and Reeg, and an ace by Brown.

South Dakota travels to West Lafayette, Ind., for a tournament at Purdue. The Coyotes open against the hosts at 9 a.m. today (Friday, Sept. 18).

Bouma, Bergner Named Valley Football Players Of The Week

South Dakota juniors Trevor Bouma and Miles Bergner were named Missouri Valley Football Conference Players of the Week for the period ended Sept. 13.

Bouma was named Offensive Player of the Week for the first time after averaging better than 10 yards per carry and racking up a career-best 186 yards in the Coyotes' 27-17 win against UC Davis Saturday evening in Davis, Calif. Bouma scored touchdowns on runs of 10 and a career-long 63 yards, the latter accounted for the final score of the game with 6:12 remaining in the third quarter.

Bouma's 186 yards are the most by a Coyote in a single game since 2009. His final carry of the night went for 18 yards, a first down and sealed the win. He was also South Dakota's leading receiver with three catches for 48 yards.

Bergner earned his third career Special Teams Player of the Week honor after making two field goals and netting 41 yards on seven punts against the Aggies. He also averaged 59.8 yards on six kickoffs and had one touchback.

Bergner made field goals of 30 and 45 yards. It was the ninth 40-yarder in his collegiate career and fourth-longest overall. He averaged 41.9 yards on seven punts. Two were more than 50 yards including a long of 57. He pinned three punts inside the Aggies' 20-yard line.

South Dakota hosts Drake in the Coyotes' home opener at 2 p.m. Saturday inside the DakotaDome.

Coyotes Third At UNO Invitational

NEBRASKA CITY, Neb.—South Dakota sophomore Matt Swanson finished at 1-over par and in sixth place to lead the Coyotes to a third-place finish out of 12 teams at the UNO Invitational held Monday and Tuesday at ArborLinks Golf Course.

A total of 75 players competed in the 54-hole event, the first of five in the fall for South Dakota. The Coyotes posted the lowest team total in round three at 296. South Dakota shot 895 (+31) overall.

Swanson shot even par Tuesday. He carded six birdies, but had three bogeys and tripled the par-4 ninth. Swanson posted 15 birdies during the three rounds.

Iowa Western Community College won the team title with a score of 877 – 10 strokes clear of second-place Oral Roberts. South Dakota and Indiana Hills Community College tied for third place.

Green Bay's Joe Duchateau rode an opening round 65 to a two-stroke victory over Iowa Western's Dale Crothers. Ducha-

teau was 3-over Tuesday and finished at 4-under par. Creighton's Jonah Buss, Nicholls State's Jack Lee and Green Bay's Chapin Orr tied for third place at even par.

In addition to Swanson, Jordan Rykal (t-14th), Cody Seal (t-30th), Andrew Brown (t-46th) and Cole Peterson (t-57th) competed for the Coyotes. Grant Campbell (t-39th) competed individually.

South Dakota next hosts the South Dakota Coyote Classic to be held Sept. 21-22 at Dakota Dunes Country Club in Dakota Dunes, S.D.

Meyer Named To UTRGV All-Tournament Team

EDINBURG, Texas—South Dakota senior defender Kasha Meyer earned a spot on the UTRGV Invitational all-tournament team Sunday. Southern Utah put three goals into the back of the net to defeat the Coyotes 3-1 on Sunday at UTRGV Soccer Complex in Edinburg, Texas.

South Dakota fell to 2-6 with the loss, while the Thunderbirds improved to 5-3.

Southern Utah's Ally Thimsen opened the match with a no-look shot that flew past Coyote sophomore goalkeeper Sydney Hardin and into the far corner of the net in the fourth minute of the game.

South Dakota evened up the score in the 12th minute. Senior Elena Tsakakis fed a through ball to senior Brenna Bills. Bills dribbled past the goalie and placed the ball into a wide open net.

The Thunderbirds responded in the 28th minute when Shelby Birds put one away from Payton Bonino.

Thimsen snagged a second goal in the 54th minute as her shot from the right side of the box flew into the goal.

Southern Utah outshot South Dakota 19-8 and led on corner kicks 6-2. Bills and senior Taylor Nivala had two shots apiece to lead the Coyotes on the attack.

South Dakota travels to Moscow, Idaho, to play the Vandals at 6 p.m. Friday.
