USD Track and Field Complex Nearing Completion

VERMILLION – At the University of South Dakota, there was the DakotaDome for indoor track. But no on-campus options for outdoor track.

That was the scenario facing Dave Gottsleben when he was hired as men's track coach at USD in the fall of 1984.

His only option was to haul his athletes across town to practice at the Vermillion High School track. And that remained Gottsleben's – and his team's – only option for the next 31 years.

"We've had a good collaboration all these years," Gottsleben said.

While it was far from an ideal situation, there was nothing USD could do. The Coyotes didn't have an outdoor track complex of their own. No place to call their own. No home meets in the spring.

That is all about to change.

Work has quickly progressed on USD's new \$5.5 million outdoor track facility, which will boast a nine-lane, 400-meter, NCAA-certified track and field events inside the complex which will be ready for action after the new year. The unofficial christening of the complex will come in May 2016 when USD hosts the Summit League outdoor track meet.

City Council Approves 2016 Budget

are already calling one of the finest in the Midwest.

A very short City Council meeting on Monday capped off countless hours of work by the city staff and Council members when the Council approved the 2016 budget.

"It does seem like we didn't visit about this much, but in reality, it was hours upon hours of work by everyone involved," said city manager John Prescott. "The Council held two work nights where both nights we spent many hours going over the details and working out the budget. It required our staff to put in a lot of hours getting their individual departments needs in order and it required the Council to be diligent in approving the

funds of the city for next year." The City Council reviewed the pro-

posed budget during special meetings held on August 11 and 13, 2015. The City Council made revisions from the budget meetings they have been incorporated into the appropriation ordinance, Prescott said.

The general fund appropriation from reserve remained the same at \$1,258,914 which includes \$1,000,000 for the pool, \$31,325 for Norbeck Street special assessment interest, \$10,000 for entrance e and \$217,5 Fund obligations. The 2016 budget included property tax revenues of \$2,190,500 that includes using an increase of 1 percent plus growth over 2015 where the state statute allows 1.5

percent plus growth. The budget includes a 2.5 percent cost of living adjustment for employee wages. The general fund has \$80,000 for street maintenance work such as asphalt patching, traffic paint and sealant material. While the overall amount to be spent on streets will increase in 2016, the amount from general fund decreased as chip sealing costs has been moved to second penny sales tax fund.

Rate increases have been included for electric, water, wastewater, curbside recycling and golf course to offset increased

operating costs.

"If people are looking at what we have budgeted for street repair, for example, it may not look like we have budgeted as much this year," Prescott said. "But in
